Report:

1. Purpose

1.1 To provide an update on the Regional Municipality of Durham's (Region) local humanitarian response to manage the influx of newcomers, refugees, and asylum seekers since July 2023.

2. Background

- 2.1 On July 10, 2023, the Region expanded a regional humanitarian response to manage the sudden influx of newcomers requiring basic needs assistance arriving in Durham Region. The Region is currently providing assistance to approximately 235 newcomers.
- 2.2 The composition of newcomers in Durham Region are primarily East African and a small portion from Ukraine and South America.
- 2.3 The majority of the refugees are young single males. Families with children and single females make up a very small percentage of the newcomers receiving assistance.

3. Current State

3.1 The Region's emergency shelter system is at capacity and is not able to support an influx of people experiencing homelessness. In response, an additional 235

temporary shelter beds were acquired through the use of hotels and motels across Durham. It is anticipated that this demand will continue into the winter months, which will only put additional pressure on a system that is unable to respond. During September, the Region is receiving 15-20 newcomers per week which is up from the 5-8 received weekly in July and August.

- 3.2 In addition to the 235 Asylum Seekers being supported directly through temporary shelter beds, an additional 50-70 remain homeless and are accessing local community agency supports such as meals, clothing and donations, and referrals to settlement services. As such, increased funding has been allocated to these agencies under the Region's Homelessness Program for the influx of costs incremental to the demand.
- 3.3 Staff are operating this response in partnership with a local settlement agency (i.e., Community Development Council Durham (CDCD)) and had established service centres in hotels across Pickering, Ajax, and Whitby. During the summer period, the Region occupied Durham College in Oshawa until the end of July and transitioned all Durham College clients to alternative locations for the rest of the response period, as students were scheduled to return to residences for the start of the school year.

4. Federal and Provincial Supports

- 4.1 On July 18, 2023, the Federal Government through Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) announced a one-time injection of approximately \$212 million in funding into the Interim Housing Assistance Program (IHAP), which will be extended until March 31, 2024. Within this announcement, was a commitment of \$97 million to the City of Toronto to provide shelter for refugee claimants. At the time, there was no indication of a specific allocation for other municipalities also being impacted by the influx.
- 4.2 By providing IHAP allocations, the federal government anticipates "that this support will enable provinces and municipal governments to continue delivering effective interim housing solutions for asylum claimants, strengthen their interim housing capacities, and limit the need for the federal government to directly provide interim housing services."
- 4.3 Regional staff have been in contact with IRCC staff directly and have submitted an application for reimbursement of costs associated with the response through IHAP, covering costs from July 2023 to the end of December 2023. Staff are also seeking confirmation of an indication of an allocation amount for 2024 for Durham. Eligible expenditures under IHAP consist of interim housing and associated costs and may include, for example: temporary accommodations; triage and transportation operations; other indirect costs related to the provision of interim housing for asylum claimants. Regional staff will be connecting directly with any lower tier

- municipalities that have been impacted by the influx of Asylum Seekers in Durham, to coordinate an application for reimbursement of eligible costs under the IHAP program.
- 4.4 To date, the total cost for providing programs and services for refugee claimants related to Asylum Seekers is projected to be \$5 million in 2023, which represents a period of 6 months (this does not include the costs of supporting Ukraine Asylum Seekers since 2022, which was in the range of \$2.3 million). These figures represent the current approach and needs of the clients being supported through various wraparound services, referrals to community supports, shelter and food costs, transportation, and other indirect costs. If numbers of asylum seekers and refugees continue to increase in the region, the expenditures will continue to grow exponentially and may require a different approach.
- 4.5 During the months of July and August, IRCC staff were on-site and met with each individual to go over their immigration claim and ensure processing and paperwork were being completed in a timely manner. On two separate occasions, IRCC staff provided transportation for the clients to Etobicoke to continue with the immigration claim processing. As of recently, staff have reached out to IRCC to arrange for more on-site visits, as additional Asylum Seekers have arrived and would require similar supports.
- 4.6 In August, Regional Chair Henry sent a letter to Minister Marc Miller on behalf of the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area (GTHA) Mayors and Chairs to highlight the increased demand for supports for asylum seekers and refugees arriving in the GTHA. The letter requests a sustainable funding model and a coordinated response for refugee claimants.
- 4.7 On September 18, 2023, the Ontario government announced that they are investing an additional \$42 million through the Canada-Ontario Housing Benefit (COHB) program to support the City of Toronto and other impacted municipalities across the province in providing urgent assistance to a rapidly growing number of asylum claimants and other at-risk populations.
- 4.8 The COHB program provides a direct, monthly benefit payment to eligible households to help pay their rent. The benefit is portable, which means a household may continue to receive the benefits even when moving to another rental address in Ontario. The COHB program provides an alternative to waiting for a rent-geared-to-income unit to become available.
- 4.9 The Region's allocation was noted as \$826,000 and has been provided to address the increases in asylum claimants by prioritizing this group with this funding.
- 4.10 An additional \$13.25 million was also recently announced by the Ontario government for settlement services, language training and labour market integration supports to help asylum claimants settle, achieve stability and find employment. This would be available to local Ministry-funded providers of newcomer settlement and language training services in Durham.

4.11 Staff from the Income, Employment and Homelessness Supports Division (IEHSD) have been on-site providing wraparound supports, in partnership with the department's Emergency Social Services (ESS) program, since the beginning of the response. During this time, prioritization was given to ensure the claimants were assessed for social assistance eligibility, in addition to other community support referrals and job seeking assistance. As such, the majority of individuals being supported are now in receipt of Ontario Works (OW) financial assistance.

5. Next Steps and Continued Support

- 5.1 Regional staff continue to work across departments and programs, along with our community partners, to provide a safe and welcoming environment for newcomers to our communities.
- 5.2 Staff meet regularly with counterparts across the GTHA to coordinate resources, share best practices and approaches to service delivery, and collaborate advocacy efforts for additional funding and policy changes.
- 5.3 Staff are working closely with Community Development Council Durham to advocate for the establishment of a federally funded Resettlement Assistance Program in Durham Region to ensure supports are available for future refugees and asylum seekers.
- 5.4 Funding announcements from both the Federal and Provincial government is appreciated, but a municipally led and partially funded response is not sustainable, given pressures within our current shelter capacity and availability of affordable housing.

Report:

1. Purpose

- 1.1 This report covers the use of delegated authorities granted under Section 19 of the Regional Municipality of Durham's (Region) Budget Management Policy for the most recent recess of Regional Council.
- 1.2 All dollar amounts are before applicable taxes.

2. Previous Reports and Decisions

- 2.1 The Region's Budget Management Policy was approved by Regional Council (Council) on March 25, 2020. The Budget Management Policy provides guidelines for reporting by the Treasurer to Council in cases where delegation of authority is used during a recess of Council.
- The previous delegation of authority report, #2023-INFO-49, covered the period of September 1 to December 31, 2022.

Characteristics of Substance-Related Toxicity Deaths in Ontario: Stimulant, Opioid, Benzodiazepine, and Alcohol-Related Deaths

Report:

1. Purpose

1.1 To provide an update on the report entitled: <u>Characteristics of Substance-Related Toxicity Deaths in Ontario: Stimulant, Opioid, Benzodiazepine, and Alcohol-Related Deaths</u>, by Public Health Ontario (PHO) and The Ontario Drug Policy Research Network (ODPRN), released on September 14, 2023.

2. Background

- 2.1 The joint report by PHO and ODPRN provides an overview on trends and patterns of single and multiple substance use related accidental deaths from alcohol, benzodiazepines, opioids, and stimulants that occurred in Ontario between January 1, 2018 and December 31, 2021.
- 2.2 PHO and ODPRN released an <u>infographic</u> which summarizes key findings from the report.

3. Report Highlights

- 3.1 The report describes overall trends and characteristics as well as by substance groupings.
 - a. Between 2018 and 2021, there were 8,767 accidental substance toxicity deaths, a nearly two-fold increase in overall toxicities and an increase in

- opioid co-involvement in alcohol, benzodiazepine, and stimulant toxicity deaths. In addition, deaths involving one substance doubled and deaths involving two substances tripled.
- b. In 2021, there were 2,886 substance toxicity deaths, which is five times higher than the number of reported motor vehicle deaths in Ontario that year.
- c. Opioids contributed to over 80 per cent of alcohol and stimulant toxicity deaths and over 95 per cent of benzodiazepine toxicity deaths in 2021.
- d. During the COVID-19 pandemic, 43 per cent of deaths involved opioids and stimulants, which represented the largest increase in deaths from the prepandemic to pandemic period.
- e. Demographic characteristics showed that:
 - 75 per cent of deaths occurred among males.
 - The median age at death was 40 years.
 - 75 per cent of substance toxicity deaths occurred in private residences.
 - The highest concentration of deaths was among individuals living in neighbourhoods in the lowest income quintile.
 - Deaths rates were three times higher in Northern Ontario compared to Southern Ontario.
- 3.2 The report describes the trends and characteristics for alcohol toxicity deaths.
 - a. Between 2018 and 2021, there was a 16 per cent increase in the number of alcohol toxicity deaths and 13 per cent of all substance-related deaths involved alcohol as a direct contributor of death.
 - b. In 2021, there were 296 alcohol toxicity deaths. Of the alcohol toxicity deaths, 92 per cent had other substances directly contribute to death, including 82 percent involving opioids, 52 per cent involving stimulants, and 10 percent involving benzodiazepines.
- 3.3 Trends and characteristics for stimulant toxicity deaths are as follows:
 - a. Between 2018 and 2021, the number of stimulant toxicity deaths doubled and 60 per cent of all substance-related deaths involved stimulants as a direct contributor to death.
 - b. In 2021, there were 1,843 stimulant toxicity deaths involving the use of cocaine, methamphetamine, amphetamine and a combination of both cocaine and methamphetamine. Of the stimulant toxicity deaths, 85 per cent had other

substances directly contribute to death, including 83 per cent involving opioids, eight percent involving benzodiazepines and eight percent involving alcohol. In addition, the proportion of stimulant-related deaths by number of substances directly contributing to death involving stimulants only was 15 per cent, involving two substances was 71 per cent, involving three or more substances was 14 per cent.

- 3.4 Following are the trends and characteristics for opioid toxicity deaths:
 - a. Between 2018 and 2021, the number of opioid toxicity deaths doubled and 85 per cent of all substance-related deaths involved opioids as a direct contributor to death.
 - b. In 2021, there were 2,547 opioid toxicity deaths, of which 90 per cent were caused by non-pharmaceutical opioids. Of the opioid toxicity deaths, 68 per cent had other substances directly contribute to death, including 10 per cent involving alcohol, nine per cent involving benzodiazepines, and 60 per cent involving stimulants.
- 3.5 Trends and characteristics for benzodiazepine toxicity deaths are as follows:
 - a. Between 2018 and 2021, there was a 45 per cent increase in the number of benzodiazepine toxicity deaths and nine per cent of all substance-related deaths involved benzodiazepines as a direct contributor to death.
 - b. In 2021, there were 239 benzodiazepine toxicity deaths of which 82 per cent were caused by non-pharmaceutical benzodiazepines. Of the benzodiazepine toxicity deaths, more than 98 per cent of deaths had other substances directly contribute to death, of which 96 per cent involved opioids, 12 per cent involved alcohol, and 58 per cent involved stimulants.

4. Local Initiatives and Trends

- 4.1 Locally, many Durham Region community agencies, including the Durham Region Health Department (DRHD) are involved in harm reduction activities, including the needle exchange program, the opioid patch return program, naloxone distribution, and support programs for sex trade workers. Please see the October 2016 Snapshot on Harm Reduction Programming for more information. Information and resources on safe needle disposal can also be found on durham.ca.
- 4.2 DRHD provides information regarding the risks associated with the use of alcohol, opioids and drugs, including information on overdose prevention, recommendations for reducing usage and community resources and services for individuals looking for help, available at durham.ca.
- 4.3 To address the local opioid crisis, the Durham Region Opioid Task Force developed the <u>Durham Region Opioid Response Plan</u>, which has four pillars (i.e., prevention, treatment, harm reduction, and enforcement) and further objectives to address

- these areas. <u>The Durham Region Opioid Response Plan Status Report</u> was released in June 2023.
- 4.4 The <u>Durham Region Opioid Information System (DROIS)</u> is an online tool that provides the latest opioid overdose-related statistics, including Region of Durham Paramedic Services (RDPS) calls.
- 4.5 Individuals and community organizations can use the <u>Drug Reporting Tool</u> to anonymously report a bad or unexpected reaction to drugs.
- 4.6 Local data on alcohol use are available on the RRFSS Data Explorer.
- 4.7 The <u>Youth Data Tracker</u> is an online tool that provides information on health risk behaviours and attitudes of Durham Region students in Grades 7 to 12.
- 4.8 Provincial trends are not always consistent with local trends. The following are local substance use data that may be of interest:
 - a. <u>Benzodiazepine Overdose Emergency Department Visits at a Glance</u> which includes a comparison of benzodiazepine overdose emergency department visits in Durham Region and Ontario categorized by age and sex.
 - b. <u>Trends In: Early substance use Alcohol (December 2017)</u> which shows that since 2009, there was a significant decrease in the rate of early alcohol use among Durham Region secondary school students.
 - c. <u>Trends In: Past year alcohol use (December 2017)</u> which compares past year alcohol use in Durham Region with Ontario and shows that since 2009, there was a significant decrease in the rate of past year alcohol use among Durham Region students.
 - d. <u>Percentage of secondary school students reporting substance use before</u>
 <u>Grade 9, 2016-2017</u> in Durham Region and Ontario.

- 5.9 Report <u>2023-INFO-74</u> provided information on DRHD's school-based health promotion services, including mental health promotion and substance use prevention.
- 5.10 Report <u>2023-INFO-77</u> provided an update on the report published by the Canadian Centre on Substance Use and Addiction (CCSA), entitled <u>Canadian Substance Use</u> <u>Costs and Harms</u> (CSUCH), released in March 2023 and revised in July 2023.

6. Relationship to Strategic Plan

- 6.1 This report aligns with the following strategic goal and priorities in the Durham Region Strategic Plan:
 - a. Goal 2: Community Vitality
 - 2.2 Enhance community safety and well-being.
 - 2.3 Influence the social determinants of health to improve outcomes for vulnerable populations.

7. Conclusion

- 7.1 The number of substance toxicity deaths in Ontario is alarmingly high and has increased at an unprecedented rate during the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, fatality rates involving the use of multiple substances have risen during the pandemic.
- 7.2 The findings from the PHO and ODPRN report suggest the need for healthcare and community-based harm reduction interventions that are responsive to multiple concurrent substance use disorders and dependencies. In addition, there is a need

for services and programs in Northern Ontario that address the specific barriers to health and social services that exist in remote areas.

- 7.3 More research is also needed to understand the prevalence of substance-related harms among Indigenous populations across Ontario to inform investments into Indigenous-led, culturally appropriate supports and services.
- 7.4 DRHD continues to monitor the local situation through quantitative and qualitative surveillance strategies and works with local partners to deliver upstream interventions that help to reduce the burden of substance use and addictions.

1. Purpose

- 1.1 This report provides details related to capital program awards and material contract amendments for the period of January 1 to June 30, 2023, in accordance with the Region's Budget Management Policy and Purchasing By-law 16-2020, as well as delegated authorities granted under By-law 17-2020 related to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 1.2 All dollar amounts are before applicable taxes.

2. Previous Reports and Decisions

2.1 The Region's Budget Management Policy, Purchasing By-law 16-2020 and COVID-19 Pandemic Delegation of Authority By-law 17-2020 were approved by Regional Council (Council) on March 25, 2020. The Budget Management Policy provides guidelines for semi-annual reporting by the Treasurer to Council in cases where financing of additional capital project costs is provided through reallocation of funds from within the current year capital program. The Purchasing By-law requires that where the award of a proposal for the total purchase price of \$100,000 or greater is issued, that a semi-annual information report be submitted to Council. The COVID-19 Pandemic Delegation of Authority By-law delegates

- certain authority to staff to ensure business continuity and periodic reporting to Council of the use of delegated authority is required.
- 2.2 The previous semi-annual report, #2023-INFO-49, covered the period of September 1 to December 31, 2022.

3. Reallocation of Capital Financing under \$250,000

on a semi-annual basis when the threshold amounts for various expenditure limits have been exceeded, where funding is required based on a reallocation of the capital program, where RFPs are used for the total purchase price of \$100,000 or greater and where delegation of authority is used to ensure business continuity during the COVID-19 pandemic.

10.2 This report has been reviewed by the Works Department and Durham Regional Transit.

- B) That financing for the acquisition at a maximum offer price of \$13,800,000 be provided at the discretion of the Commissioner of Finance;
- C) That financing for initial remedial work to facilitate the interim use of the facility totalling \$4,800,000 be provided at the discretion of the Commissioner of Finance; and
- D) That the Commissioner of Works be authorized to execute all documents associated with the agreement.

Report:

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to obtain approval for the strategic acquisition of 1635 Dundas Street East in the Town of Whitby (Whitby) (Attachment #1). The acquisition cost is currently under negotiation; however, a third-party appraiser

provided a fair market value estimate ranging from \$9,300,000 to \$13,000,000. Additional compensation of up to \$800,000 is also being considered for the equipment, furnishings, and fixtures currently on site. This includes fitted fans, commercial-grade kitchen and laundry equipment, beds, and dressers, that will support the ability to promptly commence services at the site. The existing furnishings and equipment are designed to be cleaned/disinfected to meet Infection Prevention and Control (IPAC) requirements. This report also includes a request for approval to expend up to \$4,800,000 for initial remedial work at the site.

2. Background

- 2.1 In December of 2022, Org Code Inc., a private consulting firm provided a report titled "Renewed Homelessness and Housing Support Service System for the Regional Municipality of Durham". The report identified the need for increased shelter, supportive housing, and deeply affordable housing options to meet increasing needs in the Region. This report was received by Council on February 3, 2023.
- 2.2 As of April 2023, 267 persons have been identified as experiencing homelessness in the Region, of which 167 have been experiencing homelessness for six months or longer. As of December 2022, there were 8,284 households on the Durham Access to Social Housing (DASH) waitlist.
- 2.3 The building at 1635 Dundas Street East in the Town of Whitby is 70,527 square feet and has been vacant since its use as a long-term care facility ceased in 2022. The facility contains 85 rooms and can accommodate up to 160 persons. This makes it ideal for use as a shelter and the provision of support services for unsheltered and vulnerable patrons with limited upfitting required.
- 2.4 The property was sold in October of 2022 for a consideration of \$8,000,000 and the transaction closed on January 16, 2023. The Region has made multiple attempts to lease the property from the current owners, 1635 Dundas Street East Inc., but has been unable to negotiate a rate the Region considers reasonable. Given the lack of success in negotiating a lease and the Region's ongoing need for supportive housing, Regional staff recommended that negotiations to acquire the facility commence. The opportunity to purchase the property in the fall of 2022 was not an option for the Region as the intent of the original transaction was significant

residential intensification which has now encountered some complexities to allow this to move forward.

3. Property Acquisition

- 3.1 The 2.23-acre (0.902-hectare) parcel is located adjacent to Dundas Street East, having 169 feet of frontage along Dundas Street East and 169 feet of frontage adjacent to the Whitby Mall.
- 3.2 The parcel is "L" shaped and improved with a structure that was formerly used as a long-term care facility known as Sunnycrest Nursing Home. The facility was closed in 2022 and is currently vacant. The design of the building offers opportunities for a variety of shelter and supportive housing options. The space includes 85 residential rooms with washroom facilities and several common rooms to support programs and services for clients. There is also private outdoor space.
- 3.3 The site is designated as Regional Corridor Area and Major Commercial Area within the Regional and Whitby Official Plans, respectively. The parcel is also located within an Intensification Area along the Dundas East Urban Centre Area. Due to the current land designation and location within the Dundas East Urban Centre Area, the Town of Whitby staff have indicated they would support a high-density residential or mixed-use development on the subject property.
- 3.4 This is a strategic location in Whitby, having direct access to national chain anchored retail stores and plazas in the immediate area. The property's location is adjacent to a major transportation corridor and provides future opportunities for transit-oriented development which will include the provision of affordable housing units.
- 3.5 The Social Services Department, Income, Employment and Homelessness Support Division will initially use a wing of the facility as a low-barrier shelter program starting by upfitting the 15 residential rooms with full bathrooms and common areas on the ground level of the building to increase capacity within the shelter system. This will provide space for human service, outreach, hub, and housing-first staff in the sector to help people seeking safe space to transition indoors.

4. Progressive Use of the Facility

- 4.1 Social Services will develop the site gradually using data and needs-driven approaches to intentionally manage, plan, and coordinate a variety of services at the site.
- 4.2 Building and maintaining positive relationships with the surrounding community will be a priority for the Region as the use of the facility progresses. A community engagement and communications strategy will be developed to introduce the interim planned use for the facility and to seek input into programming and services to be delivered from this location to support the residents and the community over the longer term. Regional staff, Town of Whitby staff, community human and health service providers and people with lived experience will also be engaged to support the development of the site, and to offer a coordinated and accessible service delivery model that supports people, creates a sense of belonging, and meet individualized needs.
- 4.3 In the immediate short term, the facility will be used to provide low-barrier shelter services to approximately 45 individuals while the community consultation and engagement process is underway. Initial remediation activities including, deep cleaning and disinfection, painting, floor repairs, and the installation of fencing and security measures are anticipated. Processes will also be implemented to support this use, including procedures to address inquiries and concerns from the community.
- 4.4 Once a longer-term vision for the facility is established through the engagement and consultation work, a comprehensive renovation/retrofit plan will be developed and included in future capital budget requests. The consultation work will include discussions around how to recognize the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic as it specifically relates to the outcome at Sunnycrest Nursing home, and the resulting impact on the community.
- 4.5 Regional staff, community human and health service providers, people with lived experience, members of the local community and the Town of Whitby staff will be engaged through consultation to share their concerns and ideas for consideration in the development of services and types of housing to offer at the location in a coordinated service delivery model that empowers people to feel a sense of

belonging, ensure services are accessible and meet individualized needs and promotes community and social connectedness.

5. Financial Implications

- 5.1 Financing for the site and fixtures acquisition will be provided at the discretion of the Commissioner of Finance. Based on the third-party appraisal of the property, an upset limit of \$13 million for the land and building, with an additional \$800,000 for the equipment and furnishing is recommended.
- 5.2 Financing for any immediate remedial work to facilitate the proposed interim use of the site estimated at \$4,800,000 will also be provided at the discretion of the Commissioner of Finance.
- 5.3 Financing for more extensive renovation and retrofit work to accommodate the recommendations from the engagement and consultation process will be included in future capital budgets.
- 5.4 Financing for the operating and programming costs for the facility will be provided from the Social Services Department 2023 Business Plans and Budget. Ongoing operating and programming costs will be included in future Business Plans and Budget.

6. Relationship to Strategic Plan

- 6.1 This report aligns with/addresses the following strategic goals and priorities in the Durham Region Strategic Plan:
 - a. Community Vitality Goal 2.3: Influence the social determinants of health to improve outcomes for vulnerable populations.
 - b. Community Vitality Goal 2.4: Support a high quality of life for all through human services delivery.
 - c. Social Investment Goal 4.3: Demonstrate leadership in poverty prevention.
 - d. Social Investment Goal 4.4: Expand access to existing life stabilization programs.
 - Service Excellence Goal 5.1: Optimize resources and partnerships to deliver exceptional quality services and value

7. Conclusion

- 7.1 The proposed acquisition of the site detailed in this report is a strategic purchase to increase shelter, service provision and supportive housing options in the Region of Durham. This acquisition aligns with the Region's commitment to reducing and ending chronic homelessness. Should the property be successfully acquired, further reports to Council outlining the next steps and consultation recommendations will be presented.





Please be advised that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Grimsby at its meeting held on September 5, 2023 passed the following resolution:

Moved by: Councillor Korstanje

Seconded by: Councillor Freake

Whereas the Canadian livable wage for Niagara Region, two years ago was determined to be \$19.80. This was \$6000 below the annual income of a minimum wage employee; and

Whereas our residents on programs such as Ontario Works, receive targeted fixed monthly incomes of \$733, and ODSP recipients receive \$1376; and

Whereas at the current Ontario minimum wage rate, a person working 37.5 hours per week will earn approximately \$2,500 monthly (before tax); and

Whereas the median rent for one bedroom in Grimsby as of August 2023 is now \$2000 a month; and

Whereas rent is considered affordable, when it is less than 30% of income. In Niagara west, rent is approximately 272% of Ontario Works, 145% of Ontario Disability Support Services, 75% of minimum wage full-time, and 150% of minimum wage part time; and

Whereas an annual 2.5% allowable rent increase can be combined with an additional 3-6.5% capital investment increase, raising the cost of rental housing another minimum of \$110 monthly; and

Whereas there are no housing units under Niagara Regional Housing for single adults or families with dependents, including 2,3,4 or five bedrooms in our community; and

Whereas the Grimsby Benevolent Fund reported that in 2022:

- 70+ households received monthly rental supplement totaling \$237,744
- \$79,500 was invested into one time emergency housing support as of June 7,
 2023
- 78 households are receiving monthly financial benefits to make rental housing more affordable; and

Whereas food inflation was 8.3% and groceries rose by 9.1%; and

Whereas the Grimsby Food Bank numbers from June 2023 reported:

- 19 new households
- 447 served households
- 1055 served individuals
- 7 emergency visits; and

Whereas the Grimsby Economic Strategic Plan identified the general high cost of living and housing affordability as primary obstacles in our workforce attraction.

Therefore be it resolved that The Corporation of the Town of Grimsby circulate correspondence to Ontario municipalities encouraging them not only to collect data of their housing and poverty statistics, but also to examine their pending economic vulnerability as a result.

Be it further resolved that The Corporation of the Town of Grimsby encourage these same municipalities to join us in advocating on behalf of our communities with this data, and by writing a letter to the Prime Minister, Premier, and local politicians calling for a united effort in establishing a Guaranteed Livable Income program.

Be it further resolved the Town of Grimsby Clerks Department circulates this resolution to Niagara West MP Dean Allison and Niagara West MPP Sam Oosterhoff, requesting a response on this matter within 30 days of receipt.

Be it further resolved that The Corporation of the Town of Grimsby, through its Finance and Human Resources departments, undertake a comprehensive assessment to explore the feasibility and implementation of a living wage policy for all Town of Grimsby employees, with the aim of ensuring that all municipal workers receive fair compensation that aligns with the principles of a living wage and that staff be directed to explore becoming a living wage employer.

SUBJECT: Provincial Consultation on Proposed Return of Lands to the Greenbelt

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to introduce a new proposal from the Province of Ontario to amend the *Greenbelt Plan* to return an area of land in the CLOCA Watershed (Lynde Creek – Town of Ajax) back to the Greenbelt and to provide commentary for submission to the province under the *Environmental Bill of Rights Registry* ("Registry).

Background: Previous CLOCA Commentary in Fall 2022 Regarding Removals

At the meeting of November 22, 2022, the CLOCA Board of Directors Resolved as follows:

"Res. #66 Moved by R. Hooper Seconded by B. Nicholson

WHEREAS The Ontario Housing Affordability Task Force's Recommended Goal of 1.5 million homes in the next 10 years explicitly excluded building on the Greenbelt Protected Countryside;

WHEREAS As Recently as March 24 of this year [2022], the Government of Ontario Stated that "government will not consider the removal of any lands from the Greenbelt";

WHEREAS Removal Proposals Include Portions of the Greenbelt Natural Heritage System Containing Irreplaceable Provincially Significant Wetlands and Woodlands in the CLOCA Watershed;

WHEREAS CLOCA Previously Commented on Greenbelt Expansion Proposals with the Premise of Improving the Quantity and Quality of the Greenbelt for Future Generations and Not to Facilitate Future Removals;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the CLOCA Board of Directors requests that the Province of Ontario withdraw the Proposed Amendments to the Greenbelt Plan;

THAT the Commentary in Staff Report #5808-22 and attachments be endorsed and submitted to the Province of Ontario and Conservation Ontario as CLOCA's comments regarding Environmental Registry Posting ... CARRIED"

Despite the non-supportive commentary made under the Registry, the government proceeded to remove all lands it had proposed without any change on December 12, 2022.

Following significant media attention, critical reports from the Auditor General of Ontario and the Integrity Commissioner of Ontario, on September 6, 2023, proposals were posted to the Registry to return lands at 765 and 775 Kingston Road East in the Town of Ajax back to the Greenbelt. The government's stated rationale for this latest proposal is that "...the lands were recently listed for sale. [This action runs] counter to the government's objective of building homes quickly."

Through a letter from the Minister, the province has indicated that it intends to "prepare a review of the Greenbelt to ensure that it is appropriately accommodating Ontario's significant growth... and will include an evaluation of the remaining properties that were removed from the Greenbelt late last year." Without any detail yet released, staff cannot evaluate this latest announcement regarding the Greenbelt but will prepare a Report once pertinent details are known.

Background: Two Greenbelt Removals Took Place in the CLOCA Watershed


Of the 15 areas of land removed from the Greenbelt Protected Countryside, two (2) were located in the CLOCA Watershed.

Ajax Removal


The first area of land is 42.7 hectares (105 acres) located in the Town of Ajax at the southwest corner of Kingston Road East and Lake Ridge Road South within a portion of the Greenbelt Protected Countryside that forms part of the permanent agriculture preserve of the Town of Ajax and a longstanding greenlands and open space separator between the Town of Whitby to the east and the urban portion of the Town of Ajax to the west. An excerpt of the provincial Greenbelt mapping is shown below to the left. The lands are located in the Lynde Creek watershed and contain a tributary of the Lynde Creek and a key natural heritage features in the form of woodland, watercourse and fish habitat along with agricultural lands, which are incorporated into CLOCA's watershed-scale Natural Heritage System. A map of this information is shown below to the right.



Clarington Removal


The second area of land is 34.7 hectares (85.8 acres) located in the Municipality of Clarington northeast of the intersection of Hancock Road north of Nash Road within a portion of the Greenbelt Protected Countryside and Greenbelt Natural Heritage System that is intended to permanently protect the Lake Iroquois Beach physiographic region. An excerpt of the provincial Greenbelt mapping is shown below to the left. The lands are located in the Black Creek watershed. Consistent with the location of the lands upon the former Lake Iroquois Beach, the lands also contain woodlands and a large 5.4-hectare (13.2 acre) unit of the *Harmony-Farewell Iroquois Beach Provincially Significant Wetland Complex*, a tributary of the Black Creek and a key natural heritage feature in the form of woodland, watercourse, and fish habitat along with agricultural lands. Appropriate for a site located within the Greenbelt and a portion of the Greenbelt Natural Heritage System, the entirety of the lands is recognized within CLOCA's Wildlife Habitat Network as being either Core Habitat, Secondary Habitat and Regional Corridor for the movement of sensitive plants and animals. In addition, the majority of the site is recognized as being part of CLOCA's watershed-scale Natural Heritage System. A map of this information is shown below to the right.

Analysis and Conclusion

Last Fall, CLOCA provided detailed commentary to the province that indicated that:

- The rationale for the removals was not credible;
- The two removal proposals in the CLOCA Watershed violate core Greenbelt Plan principles;
- The removals did not honour previous commitments made to CLOCA in commenting on earlier proposals to expand and improve the Greenbelt's quality and quantity.

For whatever reason given, due to the environmental value of the lands, as summarized above, it is welcome that the province is reversing its decision to remove lands at 765 and 775 Kingston Road East in the Town of Ajax. Accordingly, the lands should be brought back into the Greenbelt at the earliest possible opportunity. Further reflection should be given to reversing the other removal in the CLOCA watershed given the significant environmental features on the lands.

Re: Proposal to return lands in Ajax to the Greenbelt

In December 2022, to accommodate Ontario's unprecedented growth by supporting the building of more homes, our government removed or redesignated 15 areas of land totaling approximately 7,400 acres from the edge of the Greenbelt Area. At the same time, a portion of the Paris Galt Moraine was added to the Greenbelt, along with 13 Urban River Valleys, totalling 9,400 acres, for an overall expansion of approximately 2000 acres.

The government was clear that owners of the lands removed from the Greenbelt would be expected to develop detailed plans to build housing with landowners also being responsible for paying for the full cost of housing-enabling and community-building infrastructure. It is the government's expectation that significant progress on approvals and implementation be achieved by the end of 2023.

It has come to the government's attention that the discussions surrounding the development of the lands removed from the Greenbelt located at 765 and 775 Kingston Road East in the Town of Ajax were at an early stage, and that a 104-acre parcel within the lands was recently listed for sale. These actions run counter to the government's objective of building homes quickly. The government is now seeking feedback on a proposal to return these lands, amounting to approximately 133 acres, to the Greenbelt Area through an amendment to the Greenbelt Area boundary regulation (O. Reg. 59/05) and an amendment to the Greenbelt Plan.

The comment period on the Environmental Registry of Ontario is open for 45 days and will close on October 20, 2023. I look forward to receiving your input on this proposal.

In the meantime, my ministry is working to prepare a review of the Greenbelt to ensure that it is appropriately accommodating Ontario's significant growth, as is mandated in provincial legislation. This review will be informed by the recommendations of the Auditor General's report

and will include an evaluation of the remaining properties that were removed from the Greenbelt late last year.

As ministry officials design and launch this review, the non-partisan Provincial Land and Development Facilitator will continue to work with proponents of the remaining sites to ensure that progress on these lands continues, including the obligation to provide community benefits such as parks, community centres, schools and hospitals. This work will be an important input into the mandated review into the Greenbelt, as will meaningful consultation with municipalities, Indigenous communities and regular people living in these areas who deal with the negative impacts of the housing supply crisis the most. The properties that were removed from the Greenbelt will have to stand on their own merits: If the review finds these properties cannot support the government's objective of building homes quickly, they will be returned to the Greenbelt.

We have been clear that progress on these sites must meet the government's expectations. If planning and approvals have not significantly progressed by the end of this year and if shovels are not in the ground by 2025, the government will return these lands to the Greenbelt.

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing is seeking feedback on a proposal to return lands in the Town of Ajax to the Greenbelt.

Proposal details

In December 2022, the government took bold action to address the housing supply crisis and build 1.5 million homes by 2031 by making changes to the Greenbelt. This action was in addition to a variety of other measures intended to tackle the housing supply crisis, including four housing supply action plans to date, and was intended to support our municipal partners in planning for responsible growth and to help build housing faster and in a targeted manner, while leading to an overall expansion of the Greenbelt.

To accommodate Ontario's expected growth and support the building of more homes, our government removed or redesignated 15 areas of land totaling approximately 7,400 acres from the edge of the Greenbelt Area (ERO Posting 019-6216: Proposed Amendments to the Greenbelt Plan

(https://ero.ontario.ca/notice/019-6216)). At the same time, a portion of the Paris Galt Moraine was added to the Greenbelt (https://prod-environmental-registry.s3.amazonaws.com/2022-11/Addition%20Map%20A 1.pdf), along with 13 Urban River Valleys (see ERO Posting 019-4485: Growing the size of the Greenbelt (https://ero.ontario.ca/notice/019-4485)), totalling 9,400 acres, for an overall expansion of approximately 2000 acres.

The government was clear that owners of the lands removed from the Greenbelt would be expected to develop detailed plans to build housing and move forward with the project quickly. It is the government's expectation that significant progress on approvals and implementation be achieved by the end of 2023.

It has come to the government's attention that the discussions surrounding the development of the lands removed from the Greenbelt located at 765 and 775 Kingston Road East in the Town of Ajax were at an early stage, and that a 104-acre parcel within the lands was recently listed for sale.

These lands were removed from the Greenbelt as part of the 2022 Greenbelt Plan and Greenbelt Area boundary regulation amendments. The government is now seeking feedback on a proposal to return these lands, amounting to approximately 133 acres, to the Greenbelt Area through an amendment to the Greenbelt Area boundary regulation (O. Reg. 59/05)

(https://www.ontario.ca/laws/regulation/050059) and an amendment to the Greenbelt Plan. The government is not seeking feedback on any ideas for other Greenbelt removals or redesignations through this consultation, nor is it seeking feedback on the 2022 decision to amend the Greenbelt Plan and boundary regulation.

While this ERO posting relates specifically to the proposed amendment to the Greenbelt Plan, there is a related ERO posting regarding a proposed amendment to the Greenbelt Area boundary regulation O. Reg. 59/05 to add these lands back to the Greenbelt:

The Greenbelt Act, 2005 requires consultation with affected municipalities, public bodies and the public on any proposed Greenbelt Plan amendment.

If these lands are returned to the Greenbelt, the Greenbelt Act and Greenbelt Plan's Protected Countryside policies would apply.

The map available for this consultation is posted in supporting materials below and outlines the land in the Town of Ajax that the government is currently seeking feedback on returning to the Greenbelt.

Amendments to the Greenbelt Plan

The Greenbelt Act, 2005 sets out the legislated public process that applies to any proposed Greenbelt Plan amendments. This includes consultation with affected public bodies such as the Greenbelt Council, municipalities and conservation authorities in the Greenbelt Area and an opportunity for consultation with the general public. Consultation with Indigenous communities would also occur before any amendments are made.

Under the Greenbelt Act, 2005, amendments cannot reduce the total land area covered by the Greenbelt Plan.

Section 5.6 of the Greenbelt Plan provides that amendments to the Greenbelt Plan could be considered outside of the 10-year review in the event of major new Provincial policy, legislation, or regulation that creates the need for an amendment. It also contemplates amendments that are made for the purpose of extending Greenbelt Plan policy coverage to lands which may be added to the Greenbelt.

Analysis of Regulatory Impact

There is no anticipated regulatory impact resulting from this proposal. The proposed return of lands to the Greenbelt is consistent with government's objectives for the 2022 Greenbelt amendment and commitment to building 1.5 million homes over the next 10 years. The return of these lands will continue to effectively direct growth, optimize investments in infrastructure and support needed housing by allowing municipalities to focus resources on lands for housing developments that are making more significant progress. Lands returned to the Greenbelt would be protected by the prohibitions and requirements of the Greenbelt Plan. There would be no additional burden placed on the lands proposed to be returned, as they were previously part of

the Greenbelt and the proposal would result in the lands being subject to the same policies they were subject to prior to December 14, 2022. There are no direct administrative costs associated with this proposal.



The campaign will be centered around celebrating the 30th anniversary of Durham Farm Fresh, shopping at local farms and enjoying on-farm experiences in Durham Region.
- There will be an Apple Value Chain Video project kicking off next week and staff will be filming at Wilmot Orchards, Algoma Orchards, and Beaverton Independent Grocer. It is a promotional resource for the many assets in apple production in Durham Region and Agriculture awareness material.

B) Avian Influenza and Backyard Chickens

S. Jibb provided the following update:

- At the last Committee meeting, Brock was looking into a backyard chickens by-law and an update will be provided at the next meeting with the survey results and how they are planning to move forward with a potential by-law.
