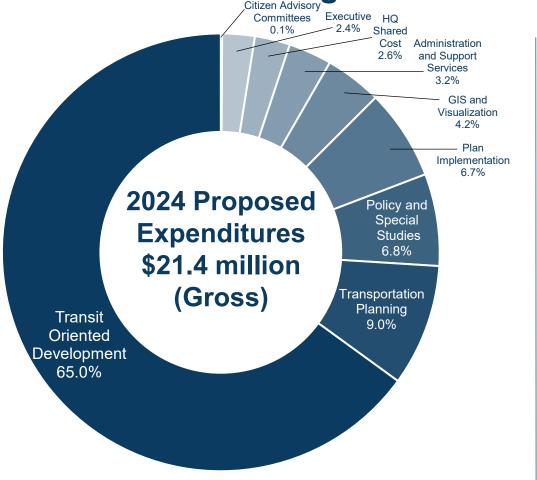

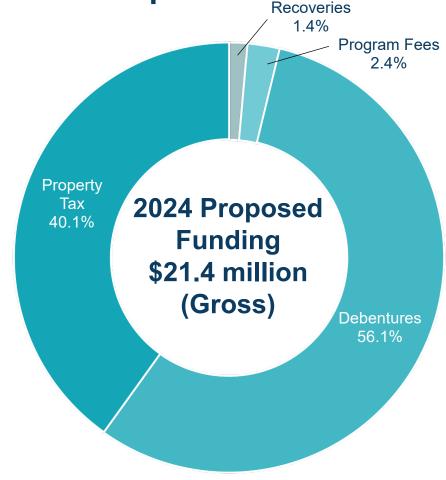

## 2023 Planning Accomplishments

## **Envision Durham**

The new Regional Official Plan, Envision Durham, was adopted by Regional Council in May 2023, following statutory consultation and engagement with the public through the first quarter of the year. Council adopted Regional Official Plan was forwarded to the province for approval.

## **At Home Incentive Program**

Presented the recommendations for the award of funding under the new Program to two projects (one in Oshawa and one in Pickering) to support the development of affordable housing (\$7.45M). Released the Year 2 Call for Applications that were due on December 20, 2023.

## **Transportation**

Continued work on, and substantially completed the Durham Meadoway Visioning Study, a key component of a connected, safe, and accessible region-wide cycling network of the Regional Cycling Plan Update.

## **Application Review**

Effectively administered the Regional Land Division Committee, and prepared for, and executed, the transfer of responsibility for land division to the area municipalities.

## **Conservation Authority MOUs**

Collaborated with the Region's five conservation authorities and led an internal staff working group to finalize Memorandums of Understanding to guide our future working relationships and budget processes.

## 2024 Planning Strategic Highlights

- Support provincial approval of Envision Durham, the Council adopted Regional Official Plan
- Enhance the Division's growth management and data analytic capabilities
- Present recommendations in support of eligible new affordable housing projects through the Year
   2 of the Region's At Home Incentive Program
- Draft the Terms of Reference for the Durham Meadoway EA and MOU for cost-sharing of the EA
- Continue advancement of the active transportation actions of the 2021 Regional Cycling Plan
- Conduct the 2024 Business Count

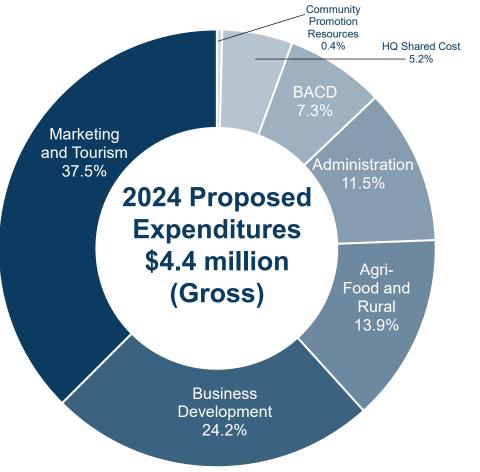

   Case.

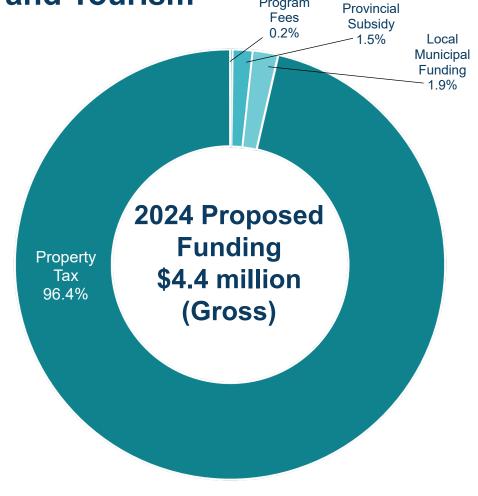

## 2024 Business Plans and Budgets

## **Reductions and Deferrals**

Line-by-line savings were achieved by the reduction of Administrative costs such as equipment rentals, postage, courier service, phones and printing.

Due to the uncertainty of Bill 23, the Planning Division has deferred the hiring of 3 full time positions for all of 2024, however the Division is operating with 30% vacancies overall.

Marketing - trade shows were reduced by 50%; will not be exhibiting with a booth at Collision Conference in 2024.

## **Risks and Uncertainties**

Bill 23 has introduced challenges and uncertainties in the context of an ambitious 2024 work plan and staff vacancies.

Application revenue may not meet forecast due to Bill 23 changes and market factors.

The procurement for the construction of the Lakeshore GO East Extension to Bowmanville, has advanced substantially over the past year, and this continues to increase pressure on the Region and the Province to ensure plans for station delivery are agreed to and advance.

## **Forecasted Pressures and Strategic Considerations**

The Region's population is forecast to grow at an unprecedented pace. Once the Region's new official plan is approved, the combination of pressures from Regional infrastructure and service planning, responding to development applications, housing and area municipal initiatives, will be significant.

Technological changes and improvements as the Department continues to offer a greater variety of online services.

The timing and amount of Transit Oriented Development and related infrastructure coordination may result in additional staffing pressures.

Ready Set Future – the Five-Year Economic Development & Tourism Strategy and Action Plan, sets out action items that require a resourcing plan, for such activities as talent attraction and retention, and place-making. Additional resources will be needed to successfully deliver on all listed actions for the future years of 2025/2026.

## **Decision Meeting Report**

Application to Amend the Durham Regional Official Plan, submitted by Clark Consulting Services, on behalf of Bethesda Ridge Farms, to permit the severance of a farm dwelling rendered surplus as a result of the consolidation of non-abutting farm properties in the Municipality of Clarington, File: OPA 2023-001 (Regional Official Plan Amendment #197).

## Recommendation:

That the Planning and Economic Development Committee recommends to Regional Council:

- A) That Amendment #197 to the Durham Regional Official Plan, to permit the severance of a dwelling rendered surplus as a result of the consolidation of nonabutting farm parcels, be adopted as contained in Attachment #3 to Commissioner's Report #2024-P-6;
- B) That "Notice of Adoption" be sent to the applicant, the applicant's agent, the Municipality of Clarington, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, and all other person or public bodies who requested notification of this decision; and
- C) That the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing be requested to modify the Council adopted Durham Regional Official Plan as shown on Attachment 4 so that the approvals granted by Regional Council through Amendment #197 are carried forward and properly reflected in the Region's new Official Plan which is currently pending approval by the Minister.

## Report:

## 1. Purpose

1.1 On January 27, 2023, Clark Consulting Services on behalf of Bethesda Ridge Farms submitted an application to amend the Regional Official Plan (ROP) to permit the severance of a dwelling rendered surplus as a result of the consolidation of non-abutting farm parcels in the Municipality of Clarington.

## 2. Previous Reports and Decisions

2.1 On April 4, 2023, the Planning and Economic Development Committee received the Public Meeting Report #2023-P-8, which includes details of the proposed non-abutting surplus farm dwelling severance.

## 3. Site Description

- 3.1 The subject site is located at the northeast corner of Concession Road 6 and Clemens Road, approximately 870 metres south of the Hamlet of Tyrone and approximately 600 metres north of Highway 407. The property is municipally known as 2774 Concession Road 6, and is located in Parts 7 and Lot 8, Concession 6, former Township of Darlington in the Municipality of Clarington (refer to Attachment 1).
- 3.2 The subject site is generally rectangular in shape with an area of approximately 54 hectares (133 acres). The subject lands contain an existing farm dwelling, an enclosed pool, a garage, a barn, and metal storage sheds located on the southern portion of the site. The central portion of the property contains a wooded area, and Mackie Creek which flows in north to south direction.
- 3.3 The surrounding land uses adjacent to the subject site:
  - a. North rural residences, agricultural lands, and wooded areas
  - b. East Bethesda Road, rural residences, and agricultural lands
  - c. South rural residences, Concession Road 6, and agricultural lands
  - d. West Clemens Road, rural residences, and agricultural lands

## 4. Background

4.1 Bethesda Ridge Farms operates a cattle farm and produces cash crops. The applicant owns a total of three agricultural properties with a total area of 217 hectares (536 acres) in the Municipality of Clarington (refer to Attachment 2). The applicant's home farm is located at the property 2669 Bethesda Road.

- 4.2 On March 31, 2022, the applicant purchased the subject farm property to expand agricultural production. The existing dwelling located on the property is not required by a farm employee and is surplus to the farm operation.
- 4.3 The applicant has proposed to sever a 0.93 ha (2.29 acre) rural residential lot with the dwelling and retain a 52.87 ha (131 acre) farm parcel.

## 5. Reports Submitted in Support of the Application

- 5.1 A Planning Justification Report prepared by Clark Consulting Services was submitted in support of the application. The report concluded that the proposed amendment would be consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement and conforms with the Greenbelt Plan and the Durham Regional Official Plan and meets the Provincial Minimum Distance of Separation (MDS) requirements.
- 5.2 A Phase One Environmental Site Assessment was completed for the subject site by GHD Ltd. The report indicated that the property has no potential environmental concern.

### 6. Provincial Plans and Policies

6.1 The subject site is located within the Protected Countryside designation of the Greenbelt Plan. Both the Provincial Policy Statement and the Greenbelt Plan permit the severance of a residence surplus to a farming operation as a result of farm consolidation, provided the planning authority ensure that a residential dwelling is not permitted on the proposed retained lot created by the severance and will be limited to the minimum size needed to accommodate the use.

## 7. Durham Regional Official Plan (ROP) Context

7.1 The subject site is located within the "Prime Agricultural Areas" designation in the current ROP. The property is located within the Provincial Agricultural System. The central portion of the property contains Key Natural Heritage and/or Hydrologic Features. Severance applications for agricultural uses may be considered in accordance with the relevant policies of the Sub-Section 9A of the ROP.

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7.2 Policy 9A.2.10 of the current ROP may permit the severance of a farm dwelling rendered surplus as a result of a farm acquiring a non-abutting farm, provided that:

- a. the dwelling is not needed by a farm employee;
- b. the farm parcel is of a size which is viable for farming operations;
- c. within the Protected Countryside of the Greenbelt Plan Area, the dwelling was in existence as of December 16, 2004; and
- d. the farm parcel is zoned to prohibit any further severances and the establishment of any residential dwelling.

No further severances shall be permitted from the acquired farm parcel.

## 8. Planning Analysis

- 8.1 The existing dwelling located on the subject farm property is not required by a farm employee and has been deemed as surplus to the farming operation as a result of the consolidation of non-abutting agricultural properties.
- 8.2 The proposed severed parcel is a limited to the minimum size to support the existing dwelling, well, and septic system. The retained farm parcel of approximately 52.87 ha (131 acres) will remain a viable size for agricultural use.
- 8.3 The farm dwelling located on the subject site was constructed in 1846, prior to December 16, 2004, when the Greenbelt Plan came into effect. The proposed amendment requires the retained farm parcel to be rezoned to prohibit any further severances, prohibit the establishment of any residential dwellings, and prohibit the barn to be used for housing livestock.
- 8.4 The proposed amendment is consistent with the PPS and conforms with the Greenbelt Plan and the Durham Regional Official Plan.

## 9. Public Meeting and Submissions

- 9.1 In accordance with the Planning Act, a notice of public meeting regarding this application was published in the appropriate newspaper, mailed to those who own lands within 120 metres (400 feet) of the subject lands, and a public meeting was held on April 4, 2023. Commissioner's Report #2023-P-8 provides information on the application.
- 9.2 The Region did not receive any written submission from the public related to the amendment application. The applicant's consultant was present at the Public Meeting to answer questions of Committee.

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### 10. Consultation

10.1 On January 12, 2024, the Municipality of Clarington provided supporting comments for the proposed Regional Official Plan Amendment application.

- 10.2 The Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Central Lake Ontario Conservation Authority, the Regional Health Department, the Regional Works Department, and the Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee indicated no concerns regarding the approval of the application.
- 10.3 No comments or concerns were received from any member of the public.

## 11. Notice of Meeting

- 11.1 Written notification of the meeting time and location of the Planning and Economic Development Committee was sent to all who requested notification, in accordance with Regional Council procedure.
- 11.2 The recommendation of the Planning and Economic Development Committee is scheduled to be considered by the Regional Council on March 27, 2024. If Council adopts the proposed Amendment, notice will be given by the Regional Clerk and Council's decision will be final unless appealed to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT).

## 12. Relationship to Strategic Plan

12.1 In the processing of ROP amendment applications, the objective is to ensure responsive, effective and fiscally sustainable service delivery in accordance with Goal 5 of the Durham Region Strategic Plan (DRSP), "Service Excellence".

### 13. Conclusion

- 13.1 The proposed amendment is consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement and conforms with the policies of the Greenbelt Plan and the Durham Regional Official Plan. The required implementing Zoning By-law will prohibit any future severances and the construction of new dwellings on the retained farm parcel; and the use of the existing barn for housing livestock. Accordingly, it is recommended that Amendment #197 to the ROP, as shown on Attachment #3, be adopted.
- 13.2 During the transition period between the current in-effect ROP (2020 Consolidation) and prior to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing's approval of the adopted ROP (Envision Durham), it is recommended that the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing also be requested to include an amendment, as contained in

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Attachment 4, as a modification to the adopted Regional Official Plan through its approval process.

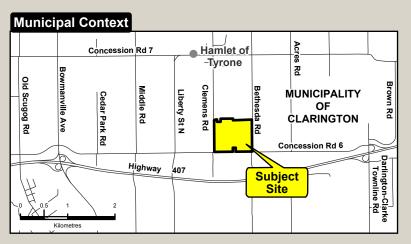

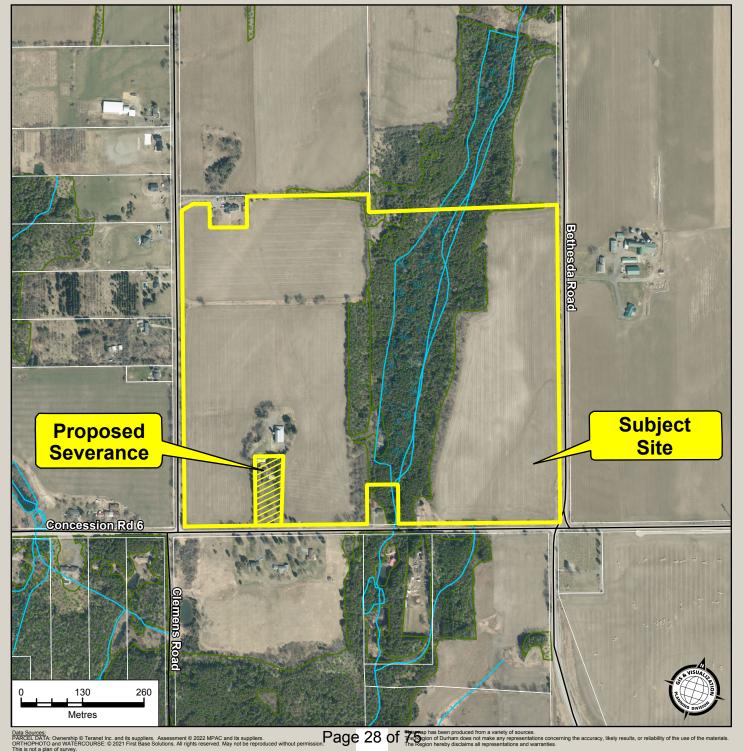
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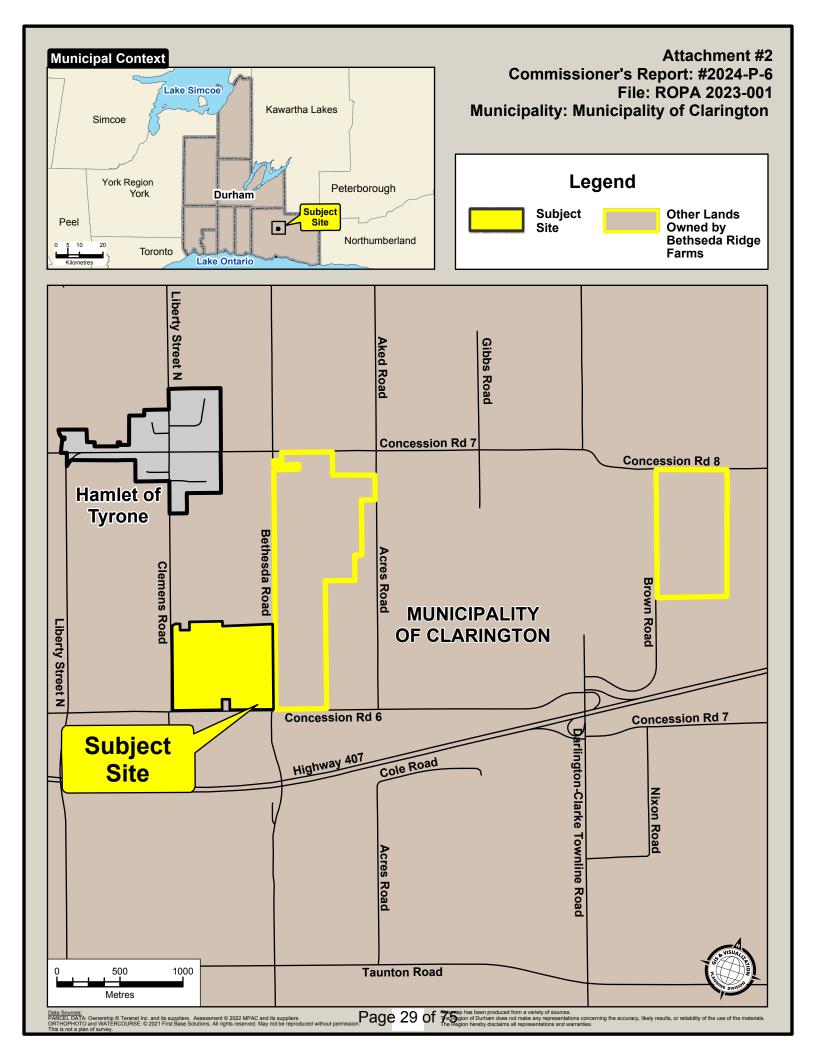

## Amendment #197 to the Durham Regional Official Plan

Purpose and Effect: The purpose of this Amendment is to permit the severance of a dwelling

rendered surplus as a result of the consolidation of non-abutting farm

parcels on lands designated as "Prime Agricultural Areas."

Location: The subject site is located at the northeast corner of Concession Road 6

and Clemens Road, approximately 870 metres south of the Hamlet of Tyrone and approximately 600 metres north of Highway 407. The property is municipally known as 2774 Concession Road 6 and is located in Part of

Lots 7 and 8, Concession 6, former Township of Darlington, in the

Municipality of Clarington.

Basis: The subject farm property has been consolidated with the other non-

abutting farm parcels owned by the applicant. The residential dwelling on the subject site is not required by, and is surplus to, the farm operation. This

amendment conforms with the Durham Regional Official Plan, the

Greenbelt Plan, and the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe

and is consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement.

Amendment (current Regional Official Plan – 2020 Consolidation):

The Durham Regional Official Plan is hereby amended by adding the following policy exception to Section 9A.3.2:

"9A.3.2 hhh) A surplus farm dwelling rendered surplus from the parcel

identified as Assessment No.18-17-010-110-06100 located in Part of Lots 7 and 8, Concession 6, former Township of Darlington, in the Municipality of Clarington, subject to the inclusion of the provisions in the zoning bylaw to prohibit the construction of any new dwelling on the retained parcel; and the use of the existing barn for

housing livestock. In accordance with Provincial and Regional policies, no further severances of the property

are permitted."

Implementation: The provisions set forth in the Durham Regional Official Plan

regarding the implementation of the Plan shall apply in regards to this

Amendment.

Interpretation: The provision set forth in the Regional Official Plan regarding the

implementation of this Plan shall apply in regards to this Amendment.

## Request by Durham Region Council to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing to Modify the Durham Regional Official Plan

## Request:

Durham Region Council hereby requests the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing modify the new Durham Regional Official Plan as adopted on May 17, 2023 by adding the following policy exception to Section 10.4:

"10.4.20 hhh)

a surplus farm dwelling rendered surplus from the parcel identified as Assessment No. 18-17-010-110-06100 located in Part of Lots 7 and 8, Concession 6, former Township of Darlington, in the Municipality of Clarington, subject to the inclusion of the provisions in the zoning by-law to prohibit the construction of any new dwelling on the retained parcel; and the use of the existing barn for housing livestock. In accordance with Provincial and Regional policies, no further severances of the property are permitted;"

Rationale:

On May 17, 2023, Durham Region Council adopted a brand new Regional Official Plan which is currently before the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing pending approval. On March 27, 2024, Durham Regional Council adopted Amendment #197 to the currently in effect (the "old") Official Plan to permit the severance of a dwelling rendered surplus as a result of the consolidation of non-abutting farm parcels in the Municipality of Clarington. This requested modification to the new Official Plan will enable the permissions granted by Amendment #197 to be carried forward and property reflected in the new Official Plan.

### Recommendation:

That the Planning and Economic Development Committee recommends to the Finance and Administration Committee for subsequent recommendation to Regional Council that the 2024 Business Plans and Budget of the Planning and Economic Development Department be approved.

## Report:

## 1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to receive Planning and Economic Development Committee concurrence of the 2024 Business Plans and Budget for the Planning and Economic Development Department. The Planning and Economic Development Department's 2024 Business Plans and Budget will be referred to the Finance and Administration Committee for consideration during deliberations of the 2024 Property Tax Supported Business Plans and Budget.

### 2. Overview

2.1 The recommended 2024 Planning and Economic Development Department Business Plan and Budget meets the Council approved guideline for the 2024 Property Tax Supported Business Plans and Budget.

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2.2 The 2024 Planning and Economic Development Department Business Plans and Budget supports all five goals of the Region's Strategic Plan, namely:

- a. Environmental Sustainability
- b. Community Vitality
- c. Economic Prosperity
- d. Social Investment
- e. Service Excellence.
- 2.3 The recommended 2024 Planning and Economic Development Department Business Plans and Budget includes \$25.8 million in gross expenditures requiring \$12.8 million in property tax funding with the remaining funded by program fees, provincial funding for business advisory services and debenture financing for design and professional services to advance the new stations for the GO Train East Extension.
- 2.4 Similar to last year, it is still not known if, or when, the operative changes of Bill 23 that proposed changes to the regional planning function will take effect. As such, there remains uncertainty of how Bill 23 will fully impact the Planning Division's budget.
- 2.5 The 2024 Planning Budget considers the proposed changes to Bill 23 and also reflects the transfer of the Regional Land Division approval responsibilities to the area municipalities in late 2023 impacting Application Fee Revenue which has been reduced by \$282,250, or 35%, as compared to 2023¹. To compensate for this decrease in revenue, 3 full-time positions in the Planning Division will remain vacant for the entire twelve months and as such the proposed 2024 Planning Budget does not include any salary or benefit costs for these three positions. It remains premature to make any additional changes to the operational aspects of the Planning Division until more information about the potential proclamation of Bill 23 is known.
- 2.6 The recommended 2024 Planning and Economic Development Department
  Business Plans and Budget provides operating and capital funding for the following
  Divisions and functional areas:

<sup>1</sup> While the transfer of consent-granting authority results in a loss of application revenue for the Region, it becomes a new source of revenue for the area municipalities as they assume this function. Under the Planning Act, municipalities are permitted to charge the proponent the anticipated reasonable cost of processing the application.

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- a. Planning Division
  - Policy Planning and Special Studies
  - Transportation Planning
  - Plan Implementation
  - GIS and Visualization
  - Executive, Administrative and Support Services
  - Citizen Advisory Committees
  - Application Fee Revenue
- b. Economic Development and Tourism Division
  - Administration
  - Business Development
  - Marketing and Tourism
  - Agri-Food and Rural Economic Development
  - Business Advisory Centre Durham (BACD)
  - Community Promotion Resources
- c. Rapid Transit and Transit Oriented Development Office

## 3. 2023 Accomplishments

- 3.1 In 2023, the Planning and Economic Development Department undertook several activities including the delivery of core and mandated services:
  - a. Planning Division
    - The new Regional Official Plan, Envision Durham was adopted by Regional Council in May 2023, and then forwarded to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing for approval, along with the detailed submission record of all background reports, consultation and engagement materials.
    - Presented the recommendations for the award of funding under the new At Home Incentive Program (AHIP) to support the development of affordable housing through direct funding support through amendments to the Region's Municipal Capital Facilities By-law and released the call for the second year of applications.
    - Continued work in support of Regional efforts to advance opportunities for affordable housing by supporting Social Services in the kickoff of the Region's next 10 Year Housing and Homelessness Plan.

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 Continued work on, and substantially completed the Durham Meadoway Visioning Study, a key component of a connected, safe, and accessible region-wide cycling network of the Regional Cycling Plan Update.

- Initiated the Cycling Wayfinding and Signage Strategy to create a unique regional cycling identity and wayfinding system and held public information centres in the fall of 2023.
- Supported the successful Pedal for Patients Charity Ride in the spring for Lakeridge Health Oshawa Foundation.
- Initiated work on Transit-Oriented Development Guidelines that will
  provide a comprehensive set of strategies that outline clear direction for
  public realm improvements around transit stations, transit corridors and
  other strategic growth areas across the Region.
- Collaborated with the Region's five conservation authorities and led an internal staff working group to finalize Memorandums of Understanding to guide our future working relationships and budget process with our conservation authority partners.
- Continued work in support of the Region's efforts to advance the GO East Extension.
- Supported efforts by the Finance Department to deliver the Region's updated Development Charge By-laws.
- Continued maintenance of PLANit, the Region's development tracking system.
- Presented information and staff's recommendation on various Regional Official Plan Amendment applications for Committee's consideration.
- Provided timely review of land development applications where the Region is a commenting agency to the area municipalities. Where the Region is an approval authority, provided timely review, comment and approval of development applications.
- Effectively administered the Regional Land Division Committee, and prepared for, and executed, the transfer of responsibility for land division to the area municipalities by facilitating training for municipal staff members and area municipal Committees of Adjustments.
- Assisted in the preparation and filing of comments on provincial legislative changes introduced through Bill 97 – The Helping Homebuyers, Protecting Tenants Act, the proposed Provincial Planning Statement, and the Greenbelt Statute Law Amendment Act to return lands to the Greenbelt.

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Supported the activities of the Durham Environment and Climate
Advisory Committee, Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee, and the
Durham Active Transportation Committee, including a Pollinator Seed
Distribution project, partnering with the Durham Climate Roundtable on
the Environmental Achievement Awards and Climate Forum hosting an
in-person Farm Tour, and providing feedback regarding the North
Durham Rail Trail Corridor.

## b. Economic Development and Tourism Division

- Delivered extraordinary customer service to prospective investors, including servicing 230 new leads, organizing and suggesting suitable real estate options for over 35 inquiries, delivering over 20 detailed pitch proposals, and hosting 14 inbound delegations and site visits.
- Teamed up with Durham's local innovation community—including the eight local municipal economic development teams; three post-secondary institutions; as well as 1855 Accelerator; Spark Centre, the APMA, and Ontario Power Generation—to showcase Durham Region's exciting potential for automotive sector innovation to businesses and investors at Collision Conference, resulting in nearly 1,000 new connections and considerable growth in brand awareness among the north American tech business community.
- Supported the Durham Region International Film Festival (DRIFF), coordinated film and television productions in Durham, increased awareness of career opportunities by hosting a Film and Television career fair with local partners, and helped businesses learn how to do business with the film and television industry.
- Continued promotion of Durham Region as a desirable location for new investment and job creation, with a 21% growth in social media followers across the Invest Durham and Durham Tourism social channels, including strong growth in engagement on the <a href="Invest Durham LinkedIn">Invest Durham LinkedIn</a> channel.
- Hosted the Durham 2023 Ontario Parasport Games.
- Organized the Precision Agriculture Field Day which built on the successful Agricultural Career Video Series.
- Organized and delivered the "Gather at the Farm" campaign to drive visitors to local agri-food producers and increase the adoption of local food in the culinary sector.

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 Advanced On Farm Diversified Use support to the northern townships; in 2023, staff prepared a best practices report and launched the OFDU zoning project.

- Organized the north Durham Building Business Forum with over 100 business attendees and a full day of content.
- Delivered the Scugog Business Program which was funded by a successful Rural EcDev ("RED") Grant application that had been prepared by Economic Development staff.
- Prepared Business Toolkits for each of the northern municipalities and which are now available on each Township website.
- Continued work on Project Woodward to establish a clean energy business and industrial park on Region-owned lands in the Clarington Energy Park.
- Led the initiative to advance Family Physician recruitment including the securing of funding from the Region's area municipalities through a costsharing agreement.
- c. Rapid Transit and Transit Oriented Development Office
  - Leveraged advocacy strategies to ensure the Bowmanville GO East
     Extension project was announced, funded, and with procurement started.

     Metrolinx awarded the Construction Manager At Risk (SMAR) contract in
     June 2023 to finalize the design of the rail corridor extension.
  - Advocacy and technical group work with the Ministry of Infrastructure culminated in the tabling and subsequent royal assent of the *GO Transit Station Funding Act, 2023* pursuant to Bill 131: Transportation for the Future Act, 2023 on December 4, 2023.
  - Continued development of station implementation frameworks in tandem with Metrolinx Bowmanville Transit Oriented Communities (TOC) Strategy.
  - Continued Region/Area Municipal collaboration tables with Metrolinx to advance the Bowmanville GO East Extension design and feasibility assessment work.
  - Continued collaboration with Area Municipalities along the extension regarding land use permissions (i.e. in secondary plans and zoning bylaws) within the Protected Major Transit Station Areas (PMTSAs).
  - Assisted with work on the Simcoe Street Rapid Transit Environmental Assessment in advancing the Visioning Study and Initial Business Case.

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#### 2024 Strategic Highlights

3.2 The 2024 Business Plans and Budgets provide critical resources to advance the programs and services provided by the Department. Some of the tasks in 2024 include:

- a. Planning Division
  - Enhancing the Division's growth management and data analytic capabilities to move towards the implementation of a growth management model that will better monitor residential unit supply, employment land supply as well as the availability of infrastructure capacity and servicing.
  - Supporting the province's review and approval of Envision Durham, the new Regional Official Plan.
  - Completing the first stage of a Regional Housing Assessment report to inform area municipal consideration of Inclusionary Zoning (IZ) opportunities in Protected Major Transit Station Areas, following numerous provincial changes to IZ regulations and applicability.
  - Presenting recommendations in support of eligible new affordable housing projects through Year 2 of the Region's At Home Incentive Program;
  - Implementing recommendations contained in the Region's 2021 Cycling Plan including:
    - (a) Drafting the terms of reference for the Durham Meadoway
      Environmental Assessment in partnership with area municipalities
      and negotiating a suitable cost-sharing arrangement for the EA work
      with the affected area municipalities;
    - (b) Drafting the terms of reference for the development of Durham Bicycle Parking Guidelines that will assist Regional staff, area municipal staff, developers and other stakeholders with identifying best practices in types and provision of bicycle parking facilities locations, and overall guidance of how to implement and manage high-quality bicycle parking infrastructure across Durham Region
    - (c) Completing the Signage and Wayfinding Strategy;
    - (d) Continued assistance in developing school safety plans as part of the Active and Sustainable School Travel Program (ASST); and
    - (e) Working with Lakeridge Health Foundation and Ajax-Pickering Hospital Foundation to host the "Bike for Health" charity bike ride on

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June 2, 2024.

• Undertaking background work in preparation for updating the Regional Transportation Model and Transportation Master Plan.

- Undertaking background research and modelling work to explore the use of a truck-only lane along Highway 401.
- Conducting the 2024 Durham Region Business Count.
- b. Economic Development and Tourism Division
  - Continue execution of the action items in the 2023 to 2027 Ready Set Future – A PLACE Blueprint for Durham, a fiveyear Economic Development and Tourism Strategy and Action Plan.
  - Strengthen the Region's internal investment attraction efforts and be a trusted voice to domestic and international investment audiences and coordinate seamless concierge services.
  - Advance the process of bringing the programs and services of the Business Advisory Centre Durham (BACD) into the regional corporation under the Economic Development and Tourism Division.
  - Create a new Investment Attraction Plan to identify target geographies and implement a 2024 Mission Plan to meet with prospective investors in their home markets.
  - Develop and deliver marketing campaigns through innovative digital channels to grow awareness of the Region, supporting growth of the clean energy and advanced automotive clusters.
  - Develop and implement a new Five-Year Regional Tourism Plan.
  - Continue to promote Durham Region as a destination for sporting events by bidding and hosting events that are diverse and inclusive.
  - Undertake Business Retention and Expansion (BR+E) programming across north Durham and advance the On-Farm Diversified Uses Project to assist the northern townships to navigate additional commercial activities on farm properties.
  - In coordination with the Durham Economic Development Partnership, create a plan to deliver support services for major expansions to the Region's top 50 businesses.
  - Advance Project Woodward for the purpose of establishing a clean energy business and industrial park on Region-owned lands in the Clarington Energy Park.
  - Continue to implement the Local Food Business Retention and Expansion Action Plan to support the retention and expansion of agrifood businesses, and work to grow the agri-tourism sector regionally.

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 Begin implementation of the Family Physician Attraction and Retention Program in collaboration with the area municipalities, Clarington Board of Trade, and the Durham Ontario Health Team; and continue to deliver welcome and support services to the family medicine trainees in the Region.

- c. Rapid Transit and Transit Oriented Development Division.
  - Advance station implementation frameworks for adoption as part of the Region's TOD Strategy for the Bowmanville GO East Extension, exploring the use of the new legislation, the GO Transit Station Funding Act, 2023 including developing the necessary Economic Study and Bill 131 Background Study as appropriate.
  - Continue to identify transit-oriented development opportunities associated with rapid transit investment in the Region.
  - Continue to build the Rapid Transit Deployment Plan and advance inprocess projects.
- 3.3 A series of initiatives are included in the 2024 Business Plans and Budgets that will help provide mitigation and adaptation measures and strategies to address the Region's climate change initiatives, including the following:
  - a. Implementation of Envision Durham, the new Durham Regional Official Plan incorporates mitigation and adaptation policies, a greater focus on transitoriented development, and a regional natural heritage system that will help address the Region's climate change initiatives.
  - b. Improved rapid transit service and the extension of GO Train service to Bowmanville will reduce greenhouse gas emissions from vehicles.
  - c. The addition of dedicated rapid transit infrastructure through the Durham Scarborough Bus Rapid Transit project along Highway 2 and a future rapid transit service along Simcoe Street will reduce greenhouse gas emissions from vehicles.
  - d. Advancing the planning and implementation of transit-oriented communities in Strategic Growth Areas, including Protected Major Transit Station Areas will create walkable, sustainable, and compact communities that provide a broader range of housing choice, with less reliance on the automobile.
  - e. Planning for active transportation projects that are designed to enable residents to get around without the need for a vehicle.
  - f. Promoting active and safe routes to school, and alternative travel choices for commuting to encourage residents and employees to choose more sustainable modes.

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g. The implementation of projects identified under the Regional Cycling Plan, including ongoing work with area municipal partners for the Durham Meadoway will help support mode shift toward active modes of transportation, reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

- h. Supporting the work of the Durham Environment and Climate Advisory Committee to promote sustainability and climate initiatives.
- 3.4 If the applicable sections of Bill 23 are proclaimed, Regional Council's role as the approval authority for certain types of applications under the Planning Act will be removed, primarily with the three northern townships (e.g. subdivisions, condominiums and part-lot control exemption by-laws). There will be a further loss of application fee revenue at the Regional level which will picked up by the area municipalities. The Region will continue to provide comments on development applications going forward.

#### 2024 Risks and Uncertainties

- 3.5 Some of the risks and uncertainties that could be experienced through 2024 include:
  - a. Bill 23 has introduced challenges and uncertainties in the context of an ambitious 2024 workplan and existing staff vacancies.
  - b. The potential that application revenue may not meet the forecast due to Bill 23 changes and market factors.
  - c. The procurement for the construction of the Lakeshore GO East Extension to Bowmanville has advanced substantially over the past year, and this continues to increase pressure on the Region and the Province to ensure plans for station delivery are agreed to, and advanced.

#### 4. Future Budget Pressures

- 4.1 The Planning and Economic Development Department anticipates the following future budget pressures that are of note:
  - a. The Region's population is forecast to grow at an unprecedented pace. Once the Region's new official plan is approved, the combination of pressures from Regional infrastructure and service planning, responding to development applications, housing and area municipal initiatives, will be significant.
  - b. Technological changes and improvements as the Department continues to offer a greater variety of on-line services.
  - c. The timing and amount of Transit Oriented Development and related infrastructure coordination may result in additional staffing pressures.
  - d. Ready Set Future the Five-Year Economic Development & Tourism Strategy and Action Plan, sets out action items that require a resourcing plan, for such

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activities as talent attraction and retention, and place-making. Additional resources will be needed to successfully deliver on all listed actions for the future years of 2025/2026.

#### 5. Relationship to Strategic Plan

- 5.1 This report aligns with/addresses the following strategic goal and priorities in the Durham Region Strategic Plan:
  - a. Goal 5 Service Excellence to provide exceptional value to Durham taxpayers through responsive, effective, and fiscally sustainable service delivery. By responsibly managing the Region's financial assets, the proposed 2024 Planning and Economic Development Department Business Plans and Budget looks to optimize resources to deliver critical infrastructure and services for current and future generations.
  - b. Goal 3 Economic Prosperity To build a strong and resilient economy that maximizes opportunities for business and employment growth, innovation, and partnership.
- 5.2 The Strategic Priorities section of the 2024 Planning and Economic Development Department Business Plans and Budget document further highlights planned activities for the current budget year which will contribute to the achievement of the Region's priorities outlined in the Region's Strategic Plan.

#### 6. Conclusion

- 6.1 The recommended 2024 Planning and Economic Development Department Business Plans and Budget meets the Council approved guideline for the 2024 Property Tax Supported Business Plans and Budget and supports the Department's role in generating new investment, creating jobs, and establishing and implementing a long-term vision for the growth and prosperity of the Region.
- 6.2 It is recommended that the Planning and Economic Development Committee approve the 2024 Business Plans and Budget for the Planning and Economic Development Department and forward this report to the Finance and Administration Committee for consideration during the budget deliberations of the 2024 Property Tax Supported Business Plans and Budget.
- 6.3 This report has been reviewed by the Finance Department and the Commissioner of Finance concurs with the recommendation.

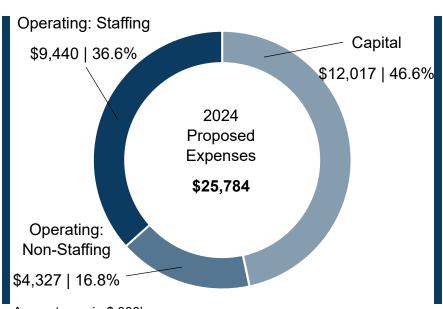

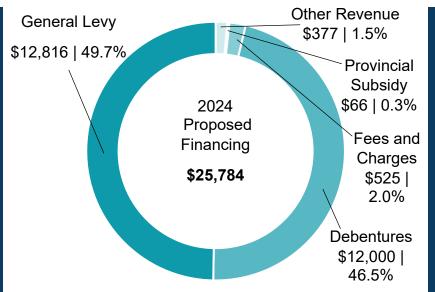

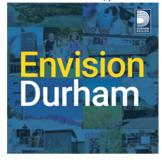

# **Major Programs and Services**

#### **Planning**

Responsible for administering and implementing the Durham Regional Official Plan, which provides a broad policy framework for managing the future growth and development of the Region.

It is still not clear how Bill 23, if proclaimed, will fully impact the regional planning function which may, in turn, affect additional aspects of the Planning Division's budget. The 2024 Planning Budget considers the proposed changes to Bill 23 and the transfer of the Regional Land Division approval responsibilities to the area municipalities in late 2023 that is projected to decrease Application Fee Revenue by 35% as compared to the 2023 budget. Three full-time positions in the Planning Division will remain vacant for all of 2024. It remains premature to make any additional changes to the operational aspects of the Planning Division until more information about the potential proclamation of Bill 23 is known.

#### **Policy and Special Studies**

Formulates, maintains, and monitors the policies of the Durham Regional Official Plan, the Region's principal planning document. Envision Durham, the new Council adopted Regional Official Plan will guide decisions on infrastructure and service delivery, long-term growth and development, through policies that ensure an improved quality of life – by securing the health, safety, convenience, and well-being of present and future residents of the Region.

#### **Transportation Planning**

Develops strategic transportation policies and initiatives such as the Transportation Master Plan (TMP) and the Regional Cycling Plan (RCP) and the Freight and Goods Movement Strategy. Supports and promotes sustainable and active transportation options including walking, cycling, and carpooling. Employs travel demand forecasting models to assess how growth will affect the transportation system within the community.

#### Plan Implementation

Fulfills planning review responsibilities assigned to the Region through the Planning Act and ensures Regional and Provincial interests and policies are implemented through the review of various plans and development applications. Administers the Region's Soil and Groundwater Protocol, Woodland Conservation By-law, and Street Naming functions.

#### **Land Division**

Responsibility for this function was transitioned to the area municipalities in 2023.

# Major Programs and Services Continued

#### Executive

Establishes and implements the overall direction for delivering Regional planning and economic development services, from current to strategic long-range planning, economic development, and tourism, as directed by Regional Council and as mandated by the Planning Act. Discharges certain planning approval powers delegated from the Province on behalf of Regional Council.

#### **GIS and Visualization**

Provides data, mapping and graphics services including the provision of Geographic Information System (GIS) analysis, database design and management and visual products including maps, artwork, and infographics.

#### **Administration and Support Services**

Provides customer care, administrative support and assistance to professional and management staff in delivering their responsibilities.

#### **Citizen Advisory Committees**

Supports the education, outreach and communication activities of the Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee, the Durham Active Transportation Committee, and the Durham Environment and Climate Advisory Committee.

#### **Application and Approval Revenue**

Provides cost recovery through fees for certain statutory planning approvals, applications, and related matters.

#### **Headquarters Shared Cost – Planning Portion**

The allocated share of costs attributable to the Planning Division for their portion of the operation of Regional Headquarters facility.

# Major Programs and Services Continued

#### **Economic Development and Tourism**

Promotes Durham Region as an ideal place to establish and do business while enjoying a high quality of life.

#### Administration

Responds to current and evolving conditions within the local economy and delivers programs and services, in cooperation with partners across the Region, in business development and investment attraction, agriculture and rural economic development, tourism, marketing, cluster development, and cultural industries. This program area will support long-term economic growth and prosperity and promote the Regional value proposition for talent growth and new investment. This program is also responsible for advancing strategic projects to improve investment readiness, including continual evaluation of the supply of serviced employment lands, and investigating the viability of strategic land development opportunities.

#### **Business Development**

Focuses on the following core areas of service delivery: 1) Investment Attraction (Domestic and Foreign), including a specific focus on growing the priority sectors of future energy, next-generation mobility, and applied digital technology, alongside continued relationship development with partners at senior levels of government and abroad; 2) Increased focus on business retention and expansion for large and strategic employers; 3) Strengthening the Innovation Community, and 4) Data, Research, and Analytics focused on continued improvement of our web content and promoting available sites in the Region.

#### **Marketing and Tourism**

Promotes Durham for new business investment and for inbound tourism visitors. The Marketing and Tourism Section undertakes marketing campaigns to showcase the Region as a great place to invest for expanding businesses in key priority sectors. The Section also grows the brand and Regional reputation for urban excitement and country charm, it works to strengthen the Region's Quality of Place, champions inclusive tourism, and drives prosperity by prioritizing activities with high potential for spending at locally owned businesses. The program works closely with partners to nurture, develop, and grow industry sectors. This program works to support and grow the Region's arts, cultural, and creative industries, including film & television.

# Major Programs and Services Continued

#### **Business Advisory Centre Durham**

Business Advisory Centre Durham assists, advises, mentors and monitors start-ups and existing small businesses and business associations to increase local job creation, benefitting the local economy and residents. Regional funding is matched by the Province through the Province-wide Small Business Advisory Centre program. Staff are working to transition the Business Advisory Centre into the Regional Corporation in 2024 (Report 2023-EDT-12).

#### **Agri-Food and Rural**

Provides support and services for the attraction, retention, and expansion of new and existing businesses within the Townships of Scugog, Uxbridge and Brock. This program also supports the targeted growth of the agri-food industry in Durham Region by working closely with agri-food organizations and businesses to develop and implement programs and initiatives, including targeted support to develop on-farm diversification, agri-tourism, and agri-tech.

#### **Community Promotion Resources**

Offers an opportunity to showcase the Tribute Communities Centre and profile Durham as a location for a wide range of activities and events, including sporting and cultural events, which increase inbound tourism and builds a quality of place for residents.

#### **Headquarters Shared Cost – Economic Development and Tourism Portion**

The allocated share of costs attributable to the Economic Development and Tourism Division for their portion of the operation of Regional Headquarters facility.

#### **Rapid Transit and Transit Oriented Development Office**

The Rapid Transit and Transit Oriented Development Office is responsible for implementing rapid transit projects, and ensuring that the community building and economic benefits associated with rapid transit investment are captured by the Region in the form of Transit Oriented Development Strategies. The Manager responsible for Rapid Transit and Implementation reports to the Commissioner of Works. The Manager responsible for Transit-Oriented Development and their associated budget, reports through the Commissioner of Planning and Economic Development.

Enhance the Division's growth management and data analytic capabilities to move towards the implementation of a growth management model that will better monitor residential unit supply, employment land supply as well as the availability of infrastructure capacity and servicing



Lead and coordinate efforts to provide a Regional perspective on planning policy initiatives introduced by the Province

- The on-line development application and review experience is being transformed by PLANit, the Division's new
  development application tracking and reporting software. PLANit is allowing staff to drastically reduce paper-based
  development processes, will improve monitoring capabilities and will allow applicants to track applications and
  monitor their progress in real time. In 2024, the Division will launch its external application portal, subject to the
  outcome of Bill 23; and
- Liaising with Regional departments, area municipalities, the province, and the private sector to advance the
  construction of the Lakeshore East GO Extension to Bowmanville, the approval of unfunded segments of the
  Durham Scarborough Bus Rapid Transit project and the Visioning and Environmental Assessment Study for Simcoe
  Rapid Transit, recognizing the economic and community building benefits that will be catalyzed by this rapid transit
  investment.

These opportunities and challenges will continue to build the partnerships and collaborations that make Durham Region a great community to live, invest, innovate and create.
