#### Report:

#### 1. Purpose

1.1 To provide an update on the report entitled <u>Canadian Cancer Statistics: A 2024</u> <u>special report on the economic impact of cancer in Canada</u>, released by the <u>Canadian Cancer Society</u> (CCS) and the Government of Canada on December 9, 2024.

#### 2. Background

- 2.1 CCS is a national charitable organization that supports people living with cancer across the country. CCS releases special reports like this every other year.
- 2.2 The CCS report is supported by the Canadian Cancer Statistics Dashboard, available at <u>cancerstats.ca</u>, which provides a user-friendly and interactive visualization of projected estimates of cancer incidence and mortality.
- 2.3 This year's report focuses on the cost of cancer for the average patient, society, and the healthcare system.

#### 3. CCS 2024 Report Highlights

- 3.1 Eighty per cent of cancer costs are paid by the Canadian healthcare system, while 20 per cent of costs are paid by people with cancer and their caregivers.
- 3.2 The average person with cancer pays three types of expenses:

- a. Direct out-of-pocket costs (e.g., prescription drugs, home care, homemaking services, devices, family care, travel and accommodation-related expenses, vitamins, and supplements).
- b. Direct time costs (i.e., time spent travelling to and from care, waiting for care, and receiving care).
- c. Indirect costs (e.g., lost earnings from employment, or lost productivity).
- 3.3 A review of the national and international literature by the Canadian Partnership Against Cancer found that, on average, people with cancer in Canada spent \$253 per month out-of-pocket on medications, caregiver expenses, getting to appointments and other transportation costs.
- 3.4 The average amount of money a person with cancer will spend (related to cancer) is nearly \$33,000 over their lifetime.
- 3.5 The total cost of cancer to society and the healthcare system is expected to be \$37.7 billion in 2024.
  - a. Health system costs are expected to account for 80 per cent of societal costs for cancer, which is approximately \$30.2 billion in 2024.
  - b. Costs vary by cancer type. The four most diagnosed cancers in Canada (breast, colorectal, lung and prostate) are expected to have the largest overall economic impact in 2024, reaching \$14.2 billion.
  - c. Blood cancers are expected to have some of the highest per person health system costs over an individual's lifetime.
- 3.6 The report shares a projection analysis that finds:
  - a. In 2024, individuals living with cancer and their caregivers in Canada (combined) will spend \$7.5 billion. This will increase to \$8.8 billion in ten years.
  - b. The healthcare system's direct costs for cancer care will increase by about 24 per cent in ten years, reaching \$37.4 billion in 2034.
  - c. Lung cancer is expected to have the steepest increase and highest overall societal cost in ten years, with societal costs increasing 31 per cent (from \$6.8 billion in 2024 to \$8.9 billion in 2034).
- 3.7 CCS notes that its estimates reflect an average, but that each person has a unique experience. To demonstrate this, CCS's report shares stories from real people living with cancer.
- 3.8 CCS highlights inequities within the Canadian healthcare and cancer care systems. These inequities place a higher burden on certain populations such as:

- a. People who are socially or economically disadvantaged and who may have a higher prevalence of risk exposure and be less likely to have a primary care provider to support screening, early diagnosis, and survivorship care, or to receive curative treatments.
- b. Rural and remote populations, who face barriers to accessing care (e.g., limited public transportation, longer and more expensive travel, and fewer available healthcare resources and cancer treatment facilities).
- c. First Nations, Inuit and Métis populations in Canada, who are often impacted by a combination of systemic, economic, and geographic barriers to accessing optimal cancer care. Additionally, First Nations, Inuit and Métis people may find it difficult to access traditional foods and medicines when receiving cancer treatment.

#### 4. **Previous Reports**

- 4.1 Report <u>#2023-INFO-99</u> provided an update on the report: <u>Canadian Cancer</u> <u>Statistics 2023</u>, released by the Canadian Cancer Society (CCS) and the Government of Canada on November 8, 2023.
- 4.2 Report <u>2024-INFO-4</u> provided an update on the report: <u>Ontario Cancer Screening</u> <u>Performance Report 2023</u>, which was released on January 2, 2024.

#### 5. Relationship to Strategic Plan

- 5.1 This report aligns with the following strategic goal and priorities in the Durham Region Strategic Plan:

    - 2.3: Enhance community safety and well-being
    - 2.4: Influence the social determinants of health to improve outcomes for vulnerable populations

#### 6. Conclusion

- 6.1 Cancer is the leading cause of death in Canada, in addition to being the leading cause of premature death.
- 6.2 CCS's special report highlights cancer's significant economic burden on people, society, and the healthcare system. The economic statistics shared in the report offer valuable insight to help inform resource planning and allocation within the healthcare system.
- 6.3 Durham Region Health Department (DRHD) shares local statistics on cancer rates and screening using the <u>Durham Region Cancer Data Tracker</u>. The tracker provides

information about cancer incidence (new diagnosed cases of cancer) and mortality (deaths from cancer) for Durham Region and Ontario.

- a. From 2010 to 2020, there were 39,943 newly diagnosed cases of cancer and 13,342 cancer deaths among Durham Region residents.
- 6.4 Federal, provincial, and local data inform DRHD's chronic disease prevention programs.

#### 1. Introduction

This report provides additional details with respect to the reporting of operational data related to the AMESA Long-Term Sampling System (LTSS) for dioxins and furans at the Durham York Energy Centre (DYEC).

This report covers the third quarter (Q3) of 2024 and includes AMESA data collected from August 1, 2024, to September 30, 2024.

#### 2. Background

To meet the requirements of Environmental Compliance Approval (ECA) Condition 7(3), a continuous sampling system (the Adsorption Method for Sampling dioxins and furans (AMESA) LTSS) is installed on each of the two boiler units at the DYEC to sample dioxins and furans.

The operation of the AMESA system was initiated in 2015 and has been maintained in accordance with guidance from the AMESA manufacturer, the North American vendor ENVEA, and the AMESA Technical Manual.

The AMESA system is used only for the purpose stated in ECA Condition 7(3), which relates to dioxins and furans emissions trend analysis and evaluation of Air Pollution Control equipment performance. The AMESA results alone do not constitute a compliance point for the facility operations.

ECA Condition 7(3), Testing, Monitoring and Auditing Long-Term Sampling for dioxins and furans, states:

- a) The Owner shall develop, install, maintain, and update as necessary a long-term sampling system, with a minimum monthly sampling frequency, to measure the concentration of dioxins and furans in the Undiluted Gases leaving the Air Pollution Control (APC) Equipment associated with each boiler.
- b) The Owner shall evaluate the performance of the long-term sampling system in determining dioxins and furans emission trends and/or fluctuations as well as demonstrating the ongoing performance of the APC Equipment associated with the boilers.

AMESA results are available at the site when requested by the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) and reported to the MECP as part of the Annual Report required by ECA Approval Condition 15 and posted to the DYEC website. As the results of the LTSS AMESA sampling are reported annually as a 12-month rolling average to the MECP and contained in the Annual Report, a request from the public was suggested to provide more frequent updates. In 2021, Regional Council issued a directive to enhance the frequency of updates. Hence, verified, and calculated results for the AMESA sampling runs across both boiler units are prepared quarterly. These reports are prepared and subsequently published on the website.

#### 3. Cartridge Replacement Schedule

The AMESA sampling cartridge is placed in situ for approximately 30 days in each boiler unit before it is removed and sent to the laboratory for analysis. As each boiler unit AMESA system is independent, the cartridge duration may differ between the two units due to alternating maintenance activities.

Note 1: The cartridge duration times may differ even though the start and end dates are the same for both boiler units.

#### 4. Laboratory Analysis

No issues were identified with the AMESA sample cartridges or the analysis at the laboratory; however, the laboratory continues to experience delays in analysis and reporting.

## 5. Durham and York Regions and Reworld Monthly Data and Operations Review

Regional staff meet with Reworld on an established schedule to discuss facility operations and review environmental monitoring results, trends, and calculations where required for all monitoring programs, including the available AMESA results.

#### 6. Oversight of AMESA Results

The Regional Municipality of Durham and the Regional Municipality of York Region staff and Reworld meet with the MECP every quarter to discuss all items pertinent to the ECA, the Environmental Monitoring Programs, and facility operations. Any concerns not determined to be reportable incidents in accordance with the ECA are discussed along with day-to-day operations and monitoring.

Any events the ECA deems reportable are done in accordance with the appropriate ECA condition.

Results of the AMESA LTSS are reported to the MECP in the DYEC Annual Reports and posted to the DYEC website. AMESA trends of validated data are presented as a 12-month rolling average together with an analysis to demonstrate the ongoing performance of the APC Equipment. The MECP had no concerns with the AMESA results detailed in the <u>2022 Annual Report</u> as posted via this link: <u>MECP Review of the</u> <u>DYEC 2022 Annual Report</u>. <u>The 2023 Annual Report</u> has been posted to the website.

#### 7. AMESA Performance

The measured concentrations for each of the 17 dioxins and furans congeners identified in the laboratory certificate of analysis are applied to established computations to obtain a result. These calculations quantify the dioxins and furans per cubic metre of gas at reference conditions. Standard temperature, pressure and oxygen correction factors are also applied to the measured concentration to obtain a value for regulatory comparison. Finally, each of the 17 dioxins and furans congeners is multiplied by their respective toxic equivalency factor (TEF) and added to obtain total dioxins and furans total toxic equivalence (TEQ). The ECA for the DYEC specifies the use of the NATO classification scheme for dioxins and furans; therefore, the NATO TEF factors are applied to obtain the TEQ calculation. Table 2 shows each AMESA sampling run, the start and end time the cartridge was in-situ for each boiler unit, and the calculated result.




Figure 1: AMESA August 1, 2024, to September 30, 2024.

While AMESA has no regulatory limit associated with compliance as it is used to supplement source testing, the ECA directs that "The Owner shall evaluate the performance of the long-term sampling system in determining dioxins and furans emission trends and/or fluctuations as well as demonstrating the ongoing performance of the APC Equipment associated with the boilers." The Regions, their Engineering and Air Emissions oversight consultants, and Reworld will continue to monitor DYEC performance in relation to AMESA results and trends. Figure 1 displays the results of the AMESA sampling runs conducted in the third quarter (Q3) of 2024.

#### 7.1 Investigation

There were no results in the third quarter (Q3) of 2024, that triggered the initiation of the AMESA Investigation Checklist.

#### 8. AMESA relative to most current Source Testing Dioxins and Furans Results

AMESA is not used to assess compliance and should not be evaluated against Ministry standards, such as the dioxins and furans source testing limit. The testing methodology for AMESA and source testing sampling and analysis are different and are set out within their prescribed sampling method and manufacturer guidelines.




Figure 2: March 2024 Source Test Results vs. 2024 Q3 AMESA Results (pg TEQ/m3).

The AMESA results are presented in Figure 2 to show how the Q3 calculated values compare to the most current source testing results. The source test compliance limit for dioxins and furans is 60 pgTEQ/m<sup>3</sup>. The chart below shows the AMESA Q3 2024 results compared to the 2024 March source test results. Results from the March source test also indicated that the dioxins and furans results are below the regulatory compliance limit.

#### 9. Ambient Air Dioxins and Furans Results–Third Quarter (Q3) 2024

The ambient air monitoring program samples for dioxins and furans. The sampling methodology, units of measurement, and reporting limits are prescribed differently and cannot be compared directly to the source testing or AMESA results. The ambient air monitoring program does not measure point source emissions, but it provides an indication of local air quality. The monitoring equipment collects air samples, capturing

ambient air emissions from various sources within the vicinity. The results from the ambient air monitoring provide insights into local air quality and may indicate potential factors influenced by meteorological conditions, including wind speed and direction.




Figure 3: Ambient Air 2024 Q3 Dioxins and Furan Results

Figure 3 illustrates the results of the third quarter (Q3) at the two ambient air stations near the DYEC. The dioxins and furans levels consistently remain below the Ontario Ambient Air Quality Criteria of 0.1 picogram Toxic Equivalency per cubic meter (pgTEQ/m<sup>3</sup>).

Additionally, the Ontario Ambient Air Quality Criteria is 10 times lower than the Ontario Regulation 419 Upper Risk Threshold of 1 pgTEQ/m<sup>3</sup> for dioxins and furans.

At a meeting held on December 16, 2024, the Council of the Municipality of Clarington approved the following Resolution #PD-084-24:

Whereas Clarington previously advised the Minister of Environment, Conservation and Parks through its correspondence dated May 28, 2024, Re: Proposal to Increase Durham York Energy Centre Throughput to 160,000 Tonnes Per Year, that Clarington was requesting Durham Regional Council to produce an Update Report that would address a number of unresolved issues and concerns related to the Regions' EA Screening proposal to expand waste throughput by 20,000 tonnes each year;

And whereas Clarington also advised the Minister through correspondence dated May 28, 2024, Re: AMESA Monitoring and Reporting, that Clarington was again requesting Durham Regional Council to provide Clarington all of the DYEC AMESA data/results (including invalidated sampling results and rationale for invalidation), as well as all underlying reports for all sampling periods from 2015 to present and to "Ensure that all future Quarterly AMESA reports include the allunderlying data and provide a detailed rationale explaining any invalidated results and report all sampling results even if invalidated";

And whereas Durham Region responded to Clarington's two correspondence items through Durham Report #2024-WR-7, dated November 6, 2024, which was received for information by Durham Works Committee on November 6, 2024;

- request for an updated evaluation of the need to expand throughput that would take into account programs to capture additional organics from the garbage that have come into effect since the original needs assessment done in 2019;
- requests for documentation as well as a summary on how the concerns/comments submitted by the Municipality of Clarington & the public were addressed in the EA Screening process as well as how and when any unresolved issues would be addressed (for example, summary table(s) referenced in their response did not include attachments the table itself referenced making it impossible to see how/if issues were addressed); and
- request for an evaluation of DYEC Monitoring Programs and emission control technologies, as well as identification of improvements required to meet commitments in EFW Business Cases and Host Community Agreement;

And whereas Durham, in WR-7, did not respond at all to Clarington's requests "that Durham will request that ECA application(s) and supporting documents be posted to ERO" and "That Durham commits to promptly posting all ECA applications/study documents to the DYEC project website";

And whereas Durham, in their report 2024-WR-7, did not directly answer Clarington's requests for all dioxin/furan AMESA data/results and underlying reports, nor did they answer whether they would commit to providing them in the future. Durham also did not provide any of the requested AMESA data/results/underlying reports;

And whereas a lengthy period (five (5) years) has passed since the last public consultation on the throughput expansion in 2019 and two years have passed since the Environmental Screening Report (ESR) was released;

And whereas there have been numerous developments as well as new information/results that have occurred which should be considered and have potential to affect the Regions' proposed application to amend their ECA to expand waste burning capacity by 20,000 tonnes every year at the DYEC including:

- Durham's Expanded organics collection program and multi-residential Source Separated Organics collection;
- At the DYEC, there have been more months of AMESA data invalidation reported, on one occasion dioxin/furan source testing was paused part way through a test run due to an operational issue then resumed, and the

These findings point to the need for more and better monitoring/reporting; and

• DYEC reported GHGs (in CO2e) are currently 25% higher than had been estimated in the 2009 EA.

And whereas the European Union, in their Best Available Techniques (BAT) conclusions adopted in 2019, include continuous emissions monitoring for total particulate matter, continuous emissions monitoring for mercury, periodic monitoring for poly-brominated dioxins/furans, long-term dioxin/furan sampling that includes dioxin-like PCBs. None of this described monitoring is currently required for the DYEC;

And whereas the EU BAT conclusions also require monitoring during OtherThan-Normal-Operating-Conditions (OTNOC). This is currently not required at the DYEC;

Now therefore, be it resolved that the Municipality of Clarington requests the Minister of Environment, Conservation, and Parks to:

- Direct the Ministry Staff that any ECA application(s) submitted by the Owner(s) of the DYEC to amend the throughput capacity be posted on the ERO for public and Municipal comment and that the posting includes the full application and all supporting documents;
- Direct Ministry staff to require public reporting as a condition of ECA approval of all dioxin/furan long-term sampling system (AMESA) data/results, including all underlying documents, on the DYEC website, as is done with other monitoring reports such as the Air Emissions Source Testing reports, Ambient Air reports, Soil Testing reports;
- 3. Direct Ministry staff to review and update the monitoring requirements for the DYEC given developments in the EU and the U.S. (Oregon Senate Bill 488);
- 4. Direct that Ministry Staff notify the Municipality of Clarington when each of the above steps has been taken so that Clarington may comment; and
- 5. That this resolution be circulated to
  - Durham Regional Council and York Regional Council
  - All Durham M.P.P
  - Lisa Trevisan, Assistant Deputy Minister, Environmental Assessment and Permissions Division, Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks

That the Consent Agenda items listed with the exception of items 6.10, 6.11, and 6.12 for NOVEMBER 27, 2024 Council meeting be received for information; and

Whereas the Township of Puslinch Council supports the information provided by TAPMO to member municipalities of TAPMO; and

Whereas the Township of Puslinch Council sees the value and significance of circulating this information provided by TAPMO to all Ontario municipalities;

Therefore, that Council directs staff to forward items 6.10, 6.11, and 6.12 to all Ontario municipalities; and

That Council direct staff to forward the following resolution to the Minister of Finance, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, local school board trustees, AMO, ROMA, Local MPP, all Ontario Municipalities and the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation:

Whereas the Ministry of Finance has introduced a one-time \$7 million reduction in education taxes in 2024, a subsidy that will be absorbed by the province through a 95% reduction in education taxes—marking the first such subsidy provided by the province to any industry;

Whereas the Ministry of Finance's plans to introduce a new aggregate property subclass in 2025, which is set to provide a \$6 million subsidy to the aggregate industry, with \$3 million of that subsidy being transferred back to the municipal (primarily residential) tax base, raises serious concerns about the fairness and equity of the system;

Whereas the claims that the new sub-class will provide tax stability and predictability seem hollow and do not address the systemic inequities in the taxation framework, which continues to shift an undue burden onto municipal taxpayers, particularly those in rural areas who host these aggregate operations;

Whereas there is significant concern that the government's actions prioritize the interests of the aggregate industry over the financial realities faced by municipalities and their residents, and that this shift in burden undermines public trust in the fairness and integrity of Ontario's legal and tax frameworks;

Whereas TAPMO has presented evidence demonstrating that the aggregate industry is financially capable of meeting its tax obligations, including substantial profits and royalty payments made by industry leaders, further undermining the need for these subsidies;

Whereas the municipal taxpayer should not bear the cost of correcting a past error in assessment methodology that unfairly benefited then aggregate industry, and the new

property tax class ratio risks further undermining the principle of revenue neutrality and eroding confidence in Ontario's legal and tax systems;

Therefore be it resolved that the Council of the Township of Puslinch strongly objects to the undue burden being placed on municipal taxpayers to subsidize the aggregate industry, and calls on the provincial government to:

Reevaluate and correct the misguided subsidies being provided to the aggregate sector, and ensure that future tax policies are fair, equitable, and consistent for all taxpayers.

As you are aware there was a lengthy Assessment Review Board hearing as well as a divisional court ruling increasing the taxes paid by the aggregate sector due to an inappropriate tax relief mechanism implemented by MPAC.

TAPMO recognizes funding for rural, small and northern municipalities is proposed to see an increase in OMPF funding. This increase is very much appreciated. This increase will begin to address the farm tax rebate shortfalls that rural, small and northern municipalities have been experiencing under the former program. Increasing this funding ensures all Ontarians are supporting farmers and not just the residents that call home to small, rural and northern communities. The impact of Provincially significant programs needs to be absorbed by all Ontarians.


If it is the desire of the Government to provide special treatment to one sector and burdening this special treatment on small, rural and northern communities ( where most aggregate operations exist), TAPMO is of the opinion that an aggregate subsidy is not appropriate and should be borne by all Ontarians.

The pre budget announcement provides \$200 to every Ontarian, adding approximately \$3 billion to the Ontario budget. If the Government is willing to add \$3 billion to the deficit. Carrying over the 95% reduction in education tax relief absorbed by all Ontarians for 2024, would have added \$7 million to the total deficit for 2025 or 0.116666667% additional deficit.

TAPMO request the following questioned to be answered:

Explain the justification of increasing taxes on small, rural and northern municipalities which are host to most aggregate operations, to provide a preferential tax relief to the aggregate sector, versus absorbing any relief through increased deficit for all Ontarians?

Thank you for your letter about the new aggregate extraction property class.


As noted in my letter of October 3, the Province will be setting municipal tax ratios and education tax rates for the new aggregate extraction property class to provide tax mitigation for properties in the class. The plan is to provide an overall \$6M tax reduction to properties in the class relative to the original 2024 tax level, comprised of \$3M municipal tax and \$3M education tax. While the specific tax ratios and impacts will not be available until after the assessments for 2025 are finalized by the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC), the intention is that municipalities overall will still benefit from the majority of the incremental tax revenues that resulted from the assessment methodology changes implemented by MPAC for 2024.

More details will be shared when they become available. We appreciate the importance of providing municipalities with as much time as possible to support their budgetary planning. We have taken note of your request to receive this information by November 30<sup>th</sup> and will endeavour to provide the data as close to this date as possible.

Regarding your request that TAPMO be included in consultations during 2025, that is an important part of our plan. We will be reaching out to TAPMO as well as the aggregate sector, and working with MPAC and the Ministry of Natural Resources, to seek more detailed information regarding aggregate activities and discuss possible updates to the definition of the property class.

The government understands the challenges small and rural municipalities face. In this regard, in the 2024 Fall Economic Statement announced the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund will be increased by \$100 million (20% increase) annually. This will be phased in over two years with an immediate \$50 million increase in 2025.

# **Property Taxation Changes and Concerns for Municipalities**

Following an appeal decision of the Divisional Court, the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) revised the assessment methodology and property tax classification of aggregate sites to ensure sector-wide consistency, resulting in tax changes for pits and quarries across the province for 2024 (an increase of \$12M municipal and \$5M education). These properties continue to be assessed based on the province-wide valuation date of January 1, 2016, but the methodology used to derive those values has been modified in line with the court ruling. This legal process was spearheaded by Wellington County. In a troubling response to the Divisional Court decision, the Ministry of Finance has introduced a one-time (2024) \$7 million education tax reduction, to mitigate the impact of these changes on the aggregate industry. This reduction will be absorbed by the province through a 95% reduction in education taxes, which is the first time this kind of a subsidy is being provided by the province for any industry.

Looking ahead to the 2025 tax year, a new aggregate property sub-class is set to be introduced, but the intent to create improved tax stability and predictability feels hollow. The sub-class will result in a \$6 million subsidy for the aggregate industry, \$3 million of which is being transferred back to the municipal (primarily residential) tax base. The tax subsidy will be funneled through a temporary property tax sub-class within the industrial property category, with MPAC and local municipalities tasked with its implementation. However, the claim that this newly established sub-class will provide stability and predictability raises serious concerns. Instead of genuinely addressing the inequities in the system, it seems to merely provide an unwarranted tax break to the aggregate industry, while shifting the burden onto municipal taxpayers and perpetuating an unjust structure.

The government's approach appears to prioritize the interests of the aggregate sector over the financial realities faced by municipalities and their constituents. MPAC's collaboration with the aggregate sector and the Ministry of Finance (MOF) to gather detailed information on aggregate sites may result in more of the same, rather than meaningful reform. While the government claims this refined data will support future discussions with the Ontario Stone, Sand & Gravel Association (OSSGA) and municipalities, the focus seems skewed toward accommodating industry demands rather than ensuring fairness and accountability for all taxpayers. This direction threatens to undermine any hope of establishing a principled and sustainable approach to aggregate taxation, leaving communities to bear the consequences.

In light of these changes, TAPMO wishes to voice serious concerns regarding the new tax class ratio established by the Ministry of Finance. Contrary to fostering a revenue-neutral outcome, this adjustment is expected to lead to \$3 million being refunded directly from local taxpayers to the aggregate industry starting in 2025 and beyond. Neither the Ministry nor representatives from the aggregate industry have provided sufficient justification for what seems to be a residential taxpayer-funded subsidy to benefit a for-profit industry. Concerns from both the Ministry of Finance and the aggregate sector highlight that potential cost increases for residential housing stemming from the Assessment Review Board (ARB) ruling have not been adequately assessed or documented. Claims suggesting a mere \$3-4 increase per Ontarian fail to capture the disproportionate impact this assessment framework will have on rural residents, who predominantly host these aggregate operations.

The OSSGA has yet to provide conclusive evidence of the industry's inability to contribute its fair share of taxes. In fact, TAPMO has presented evidence indicating that aggregate producers can meet their tax obligations. For example, Dufferin (CRH) paid \$2 million in royalties to the University of Guelph in 2023, while St. Mary's Cement (CBM Canada) reported total net revenues of \$109,785,000 USD for aggregate products in their 2022 financial statements.

While TAPMO recognizes that tax increases on any property class may be unpopular, we argue that the aggregate industry has long benefited from an inappropriate tax discount. The Divisional Court ruling clarified that MPAC lacked the authority to grant such tax relief. The municipal taxpayers should not have to provide tax relief to the industry as a result of correcting an inappropriate tax benefit that the industry has come to expect. The new property tax class ratio fails to maintain revenue neutrality and threatens to erode trust in Ontario's legal frameworks. Ontarians deserve confidence that these processes are respected and upheld.

TAPMO remains committed to advocating for fair and equitable taxation practices that support both municipal taxpayers and the sustainability of our communities. The future of Ontario's aggregate taxation framework must prioritize transparency, fairness, and the principles of revenue neutrality.



# Property Taxation Changes and Concerns for Municipalities -What's Next?

TAPMO is urging members to raise awareness of this issue by requesting your Municipal Council consider supporting the following motion:

Whereas the Ministry of Finance has introduced a one-time \$7 million reduction in education taxes in 2024, a subsidy that will be absorbed by the province through a 95% reduction in education taxes—marking the first such subsidy provided by the province to any industry;

Whereas the Ministry of Finance's plans to introduce a new aggregate property sub-class in 2025, which is set to provide a \$6 million subsidy to the aggregate industry, with \$3 million of that subsidy being transferred back to the municipal (primarily residential) tax base, raises serious concerns about the fairness and equity of the system;

Whereas the claims that the new sub-class will provide tax stability and predictability seem hollow and do not address the systemic inequities in the taxation framework, which continues to shift an undue burden onto municipal taxpayers, particularly those in rural areas who host these aggregate operations;

Whereas there is significant concern that the government's actions prioritize the interests of the aggregate industry over the financial realities faced by municipalities and their residents, and that this shift in burden undermines public trust in the fairness and integrity of Ontario's legal and tax frameworks;

Whereas TAPMO has presented evidence demonstrating that the aggregate industry is financially capable of meeting its tax obligations, including substantial profits and royalty payments made by industry leaders, further undermining the need for these subsidies;

Whereas the municipal taxpayer should not bear the cost of correcting a past error in assessment methodology that unfairly benefited the aggregate industry, and the new property tax class ratio risks further undermining the principle of revenue neutrality and eroding confidence in Ontario's legal and tax systems;

Therefore be it resolved that the Council [INSERT MUNICIPALITY] strongly objects to the undue burden being placed on municipal taxpayers to subsidize the aggregate industry, and calls on the provincial government to:

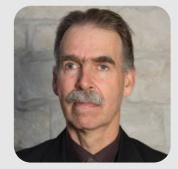

# Re: Aggregate Assessment

I am writing to raise TAPMO's concerns with the new tax class ratio for aggregate operations that does not maintain a revenue neutral outcome. TAPMO has been informed that the new tax class ratio will result in \$3 million of assessment being refunded to the aggregate industry for 2025 and beyond.

To date, neither the Ministry nor the aggregate industry has provided any justification for this residential taxpayer funded subsidy. The concerns raised by the MOF and the aggregate industry indicate that the potential cost increase for residential housing resulting from the ARB ruling applied across the province has not been thoroughly assessed or documented. Impacts of \$3-4 dollars per Ontarian are not accurate. Most aggregate operations are located in rural municipalities, thus rural residents will be providing this relief on a disproportionate level.

I would draw your attention to the developments in the Town of Erin. Developers are largely paying nearly \$200 million in up-front cost to build a wastewater treatment facility. This cost will be a direct pass through to the cost of the homes serviced by the treatment plant. In comparison, a revenue neutral tax class would be adding less than a quarter dollar to the cost of per tonne of aggregate.

Generally speaking, in Ontario, the provincial framework we strive to achieve is known at the municipal level as "Growth pays for Growth". Taxing aggregate properly brings us as a society closer to achieving that result. The aggregate tax class ratio does not support the revenue neutral tax outcome, nor does it support the principle of "Growth pays for Growth".

The OSSGA has failed to bring definitive evidence of the industry's inability to pay their fair share of taxes. Quite contrary, TAPMO has provided evidence of the ability of producers to pay their fair share. We are referencing the royalties Dufferin paid the University of Guelph (\$2 million in 2023). Further to the point, St. Mary's Cement's (CBM Canada) audited 2022 Financial Statements indicate a total net revenue for aggregate products at a whopping \$109,785,000 USD.

TAPMO recognizes that any increase of taxes on any property class would likely not be welcome. Unfortunately, as recorded in the Divisional Court decision, MPAC did not have the legislative authority to be providing tax relief (page 12 note 55 of the decision) that the industry experienced from 2016 onward. The aggregate industry is accustomed to an inappropriate tax discount. In TAPMO's view, residential taxpayers should not have to provide tax relief to the industry as a result of correcting an inappropriate tax benefit that the industry had come to expect. We respectively reassert our position that OSSGA has not brought forward evidence to support their claim, other than highlighting the displeasure of paying more taxes. We have also not received evidence from the MOF supporting this relief for 2025 and beyond.

Lastly, we are deeply concerned that the lengthy and expensive legal process undertaken by Wellington County, and the decisions ordered by both the Assessment Review Board and Divisional Court is being undermined. This is particularly concerning given that the ARB decision was upheld. The new property tax class ratio fails to maintain a revenue-neutral tax assessment and undermines the legal process, which incurred significant costs for Wellington County taxpayers. This is extremely disturbing; Ontarians must have confidence in the legal processes in Ontario. Undermining the ARB assessment through a property tax class ratio that does not preserve revenue neutrality erodes that trust.

It is essential that discussions be inclusive and that any future assessment changes involve a fair and balanced approach in consultation with municipal partners, not just the aggregate sector.

TAPMO thanks the Ministry for the opportunity to comment on this very important issue and we look forward to strengthening this relationship.

# RE: Opposition to the Transportation and Deposition of Naturally Occurring Radioactive Material (NORM) and Mine Tailings from the Former Beaucage Mine and Waste Site

On behalf of the Councils of the Corporation of the Township of Nairn and Hyman and the Corporation of the Township of Baldwin, we are formally submitting the attached joint resolution regarding our serious concerns over the proposed transportation and deposition of radioactive naturally occurring materials (NORM) to the Agnew Lake Tailings Management Area (ALTMA).

Our Councils recently convened a Joint Emergency Meeting on October 2, 2024, to discuss this matter in response to information presented at a Town Hall Meeting on September 11, 2024, by the Ministry of Mines, the Ministry of Transportation, and the Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission. During our deliberations, it became evident that the materials slated for transport are not correctly categorized as NORM, but rather as mine tailings containing not only radioactive substances like niobium and uranium but also other hazardous heavy metals.

We are gravely concerned about the potential environmental and health impacts this project may have, particularly on Agnew Lake—a critical drinking water source for our communities. Our position is that ALTMA should be remediated using clean materials to mitigate existing contamination rather than accepting additional hazardous materials that could exacerbate environmental harm.

This joint resolution calls upon your government and relevant ministries to halt any further actions related to the transportation of this hazardous product to the ALTMA site. The resolution reads as follows:

At the Township of Terrace Bay Regular Council Meeting held on Monday September 16, 2024, the following resolution was put forth by Councillor Chris Dube and was passed.

#### Re: Ambulance Shortages and Healthcare System Issues

#### Resolution 266-2024 Moved by: Councillor Johnson Seconded by: Councillor Dube

WHEREAS, the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Terrace Bay is gravely concerned about the ongoing shortages and staffing challenges facing Superior North EMS (SNEMS);

WHEREAS, the provincial funding for ambulance services, currently at 50%, along with the city's 50% contribution, has been falling short, leading to financial strain on municipalities and regional partners, including the City of Thunder Bay;

WHEREAS, the rolling shortages of paramedics and EMS personnel in the region present a significant risk to public safety and healthcare services in northern communities, which are disproportionately affected by the province-wide shortage of paramedics;

WHEREAS, recruitment and retention issues, including insufficient wages and benefits, lack of mental health supports, frequent exposure to traumatic experiences, and inadequate recovery time between work periods, are causing high turnover rates and burnout among EMS workers;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Honorable Sylvia Jones, Minister of Health, be requested to take immediate action to address the funding shortfalls and structural challenges in the delivery of EMS services in northern communities, including:

- 1. Increasing provincial funding to support EMS services and reduce the financial burden on municipalities;
- 2. Implementing incentives such as "learn and stay" grants to encourage paramedics to live and work in northern Ontario;
- 3. Enhancing support systems for EMS workers, including improved wages, benefits, and mental health resources.

Dear Minister Anand and Mayor Chow,

I am writing to you to express my support for the sustained operation and development of Billy Bishop Toronto City Airport. As the President of the Northwestern Ontario Municipal Association, I am extremely concerned to learn that the Tripartite Agreement that governs operations at the Airport expires in 2033 – less than 9 years from now.

Billy Bishop Airport provides a critical service and point of connection for the North. Many of my community members rely on Billy Bishop airport to visit family, connect through to other destinations for work, travel and tourism or to access critical medical services, the convenience and ease of Billy Bishop Airport cannot be matched. It has been reported widely that Northern Ontario communities have experience drastic reductions in air service coming out of the COVID pandemic. Reliable air connectivity available through Billy Bishop Airport is an important economic and social lifeline for my community.

We were pleased to see the Federal Government's investment in a US Customs and Border Patrol preclearance facility, which is expected to open in 2025. This is welcomed news for communities in Northwestern Ontario as it will enable more and better connections through Billy Bishop Airport and amplify the airport's already strong economic contribution. We viewed this investment in the airports long term future as recognition of the very important role the airport has come to play for the communities it connects including Northwestern Ontario – very much at odds with an agreement that expires in a matter of years.

To that end, we would implore you, as signatories to the Tripartite Agreement, to commence a process to modernize the Tripartite Agreement and secure the long-term future of Canada's 9<sup>th</sup>-busiest airport and 3<sup>rd</sup>-busiest in Ontario. My community members rely on this service, and we

want to see even more connections and expanded services to the North. As elected leaders, we have a responsibility to think past our own front doors, reflect the needs of all of our constituents and those beyond our communities who are impacted by our decisions. Certainty about the airport's long-term future should not be something we as leaders should need to think long about. The time is now for the parties of the agreement to move forward with urgency to ensure this vital piece of transportation infrastructure and the important connections it facilitates are sustained.

A meeting of the Accessibility Advisory Committee was held on Tuesday, November 26, 2024 at Regional Headquarters Building, 605 Rossland Road East, Whitby at 1:00 PM. Electronic participation was permitted for this meeting.

J. McEwen, Vice-Chair, chaired the meeting.

### 1. Traditional Territory Acknowledgment

J. McEwen, Vice-Chair, read the following land acknowledgement:

The Region of Durham exists on lands that the Michi Saagiig Anishinaabeg inhabited for thousands of years prior to European colonization. These lands are the traditional and treaty territories of the Nations covered under the Williams Treaties, including the Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation, Alderville First Nation, Hiawatha First Nation, Curve Lake First Nation, and the Chippewa Nations of Georgina Island, Beausoleil and Rama.

### 3. Declarations of Pecuniary Interest

#### 4. Adoption of Minutes

Moved by D. Campbell, Seconded by S. Sones, That the minutes of the Accessibility Advisory Committee meeting held on Tuesday, September 24, 2024, be adopted. CARRIED

#### 5. **Presentations**

A) Anu Sharma, Policy Advisor, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Division, re: Region of Durham Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Strategy

Anu Sharma, Policy Advisor, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Division, provided a PowerPoint presentation with regards to the Region of Durham Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Strategy.

A. Sharma advised that the presentation will share how they got to the DEI strategy; what they are trying to accomplish; and the timelines for the work being done. She stated that all levels of government have equity focused strategies and are working towards removing barriers to people from Indigenous and equity seeking groups.

A. Sharma also advised that the goal of the strategy is to look at how Durham Region conducts its business by determining if it is being done in a manner that is equitable to all residents. The DEI Division was created in 2021 and has been focusing on fact finding over the past three years, including a workplace census which was conducted in 2022 and resulted in 86 recommendations. One of the recommendations was an equity focused strategy and the DEI Division began working on this with Ediseed in the Summer 2024. An environmental scan within public sector organizations in Canada and the GTHA was done and using that methodology they have moved on to an engagement plan which is phase four of six. A survey has been created called Informing Durham Region's DEI Strategy and consists of five questions. The survey deadline is December 15, 2024. The next step is compiling the data and developing a strategy that will be available in March 2025.

P. Hines requested feedback from Committee members and advised they will be meeting with service providers and working with the eight lower-tier municipalities on this project.

A. Sharma responded to questions with regards to which service providers the DEI Division will be working with on the DEI Strategy.

Committee members provided the following feedback:

- With respect to question 2: suggested changing the wording to read either "what examples can you provide of fair access to services and opportunities in Durham" or "what outcomes do you associate with fair access to services in Durham:
- With respect to question 3: specify what kinds of inclusion challenges you are referring to;
- With respect to question 5: suggested changing the wording to read "what specific actions can respondents take to promote inclusion in events, programs or services";
- With respect to question 6: prompt respondents to think about who should be involved and how by requesting what resources, partnerships or supports are needed to implement the actions; by adding a section to ask about challenges or specific solutions to marginalized groups and address the intersectionality component; and by testing the survey on a small subset before sending out to the community.

A. Sharma advised that the Committee's feedback would be provided to Ediseed.

#### 6. Discussion Items

#### A) <u>New Process for Nomination of AAC Award Winners</u>

N. Dash advised that feedback was received from Committee members and other stakeholders regarding the AAC Awards event and that the main concern was how nominees were chosen for the awards. N. Dash stated that using feedback from the committee, a new process has been established, which was provided to Committee members prior to the meeting for their review.

N. Dash advised the new process will look at how nominees made a significant contribution to improve access for persons with disabilities in the areas of governance/policies; impact; inclusive programming; service delivery; transportation; housing; communication; employment; built environment; and education.

Discussion ensued with regards to the nomination process and who is eligible to nominate a person or business; how the weight of the factors are taken into consideration; how the scoring matrix is taken into consideration and the grading factors; providing more space for the description on why the nominee should be nominated for an award; ensuring nominees who are strong in one area are able to be considered to be nominated for an award; and reducing the categories to a maximum of three.

N. Dash advised that a further update will be provided at a future meeting.

#### 7. Correspondence

There were no items of correspondence to consider.

#### 8. Information Items

A) Direction Memorandum re: Resolution adopted by the Finance and Administration <u>Committee as its meeting held on November 12, 2024</u>

Direction Memorandum from Leigh Fleury, Deputy Clerk, Region of Durham regarding Resolution Adopted by the Finance and Administration Committee at its meeting held on November 12, 2024 was provided as Attachment #2 to the agenda and received.

In response to a question from a Committee member, P. Hines advised that the direction memorandum was referred to the Office of the Chief Administrative Officer and falls under Allison Hector-Alexander's portfolio and can provide any updates to the Committee that arise.

### B) Education Sub-Committee Update

N. Dash provided the following update:

- There will be a flag raising, lunch and panel discussion for International Day of Persons with Disabilities being held on December 2, 2024 at 12:00 pm outside the Council Chambers. Committee member Meghann Lloyd will be the moderator for the panel discussion and Committee member Wayne Henshall will be sitting on the panel.
- Looking to have a forum next year October in recognition of National Disability Employment Awareness month to bring together employers and businesses to listen, collaborate and learn from those who have hired persons with disabilities.

### C) Update on the Transit Advisory Committee (TAC)

The November 19, 2024 Transit Advisory Committee meeting update from J. McEwen was emailed to Committee members.

W. Henshall advised that a review of the communication methods will be done on how Durham Region Transit communicates service and service transitions and interruptions by leveraging other methods of communication outside of technology to ensure all users receive the information and there is clarity of messages and messages are received in a timely manner.

#### D) Accessibility Coordinator Update

N. Dash provided the following update:

- The Accessible Taxi Survey is completed, and the results will be shared when they are available.
- At the Regional Accessibility Coordinators meeting, and in response to discussion at the last AAC meeting, the lower tier municipalities advised they would not be able to provide access to their workplans due to short turnaround requirements and they would be happy to work in collaboration with Durham Region AAC on events starting in 2025.
- At the Regional Accessibility Coordinators meeting, it was decided to have a virtual networking event for all Accessibility Advisory Committees. The calendar invite will be provided to Committee members.

Discussion ensued with regards to hosting the AAC networking event in person; working to remove the transportation barrier to hold the event in person; providing transportation support for those needed; bringing in a professional moderator to assist with hosting the event virtually; and potential in-person event locations. N. Dash advised she would bring these comments back to the next Regional Accessibility Coordinators meeting in December.

 Durham Region Transit is providing training to operators on accessibility and asked Committee members for their feedback on assisting in providing a training video to assist the training specialist.

Discussion ensued with regards to the lack of service providers that do not have proper training; collaborating with Durham Region Transit to provide training videos; how long the operator training takes; and whether accessibility training has been provided in the past.

• An election of the Chair and Vice-Chair will be conducted at the January 28, 2025 meeting. The AAC Workplan will need to be adopted at the January 28, 2025 meeting. Continuing to look for new Committee members to fill the current vacancies.
