Boards of health are required to “superintend, provide or ensure the provision of the health programs and services required by the [Health Protection and Promotion] Act and the regulations to the persons who reside in the health unit served by the board” (section 4, clause a, HPPA). In addition, medical officers of health are required to “[report] directly to the board of health on issues relating to public health concerns and to public health programs and services under this or any other Act” (sub-section 67.(1), HPPA).

Accordingly, the Health Information Update is a component of the Health Department’s ‘Accountability Framework’, which also may include program and other reports, Health Plans, Quality Enhancement Plans, Durham Health Check-Ups, business plans and budgets; provincial performance indicators and targets, monitoring, compliance audits and assessments; RDPS certification; and accreditation by Accreditation Canada.

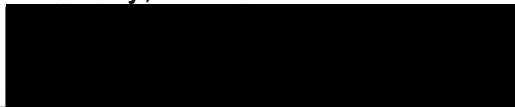

RE: Request the Redistribution of the Provincial Land Transfer Tax and GST to Municipalities for Sustainable Infrastructure Funding

Please be advised that at its meeting of January 28, 2025, Council of the Town of Niagara on-the-Lake adopted the following resolution:

Whereas municipalities face growing infrastructure needs, including roads, bridges, public transit, water systems, and other critical services, which are essential to community well-being and economic development; and

Whereas the current sources of municipal revenue, including property taxes and user fees, are insufficient to meet these increasing demands for infrastructure investment; and

Whereas the Province of Ontario currently collects the Land Transfer Tax (LTT) on property transactions in municipalities across the province, generating significant revenue that is not directly shared with municipalities; and

Whereas the Federal Government collects the Goods and Services Tax (GST) on property transactions, a portion of which could be directed to municipalities to address local infrastructure needs; and

Whereas redistributing a portion of the Provincial Land Transfer Tax and GST to municipalities would provide a predictable and sustainable source of funding for local infrastructure projects without creating a new tax burden on residents or homebuyers; and

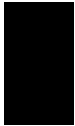
Whereas a redistribution of a portion of the existing Land Transfer Tax and GST would allow municipalities to better plan and invest in long-term infrastructure initiatives, supporting local economic growth and improving the quality of life for residents;

1. Now Therefore Be It Hereby Resolved That Niagara-on-the-Lake Town Council formally requests the Provincial Government to consider redistributing a portion of the Land Transfer Tax collected on property transactions to municipalities; and

2. Be It Further Resolved That Niagara-on-the-Lake Town Council calls on the Federal Government to allocate a percentage of the GST collected on property sales to municipalities; and
3. Be It Further Resolved That this redistribution of the Land Transfer Tax and GST should be structured to provide predictable and sustainable funding to municipalities, allowing for better long-term planning and investment in infrastructure projects that benefit local communities, thus ensuring that local governments receive a fair share of the revenue to address critical infrastructure needs; and

Monday, February 10, 2025

Oral Motion

“THAT Council supports the Town of Halton Hills Resolution No. 2025-0010 regarding the Sovereignty of Canada.”

Moved by Wendy Brunetta, Seconded by Steven Maki, Motion Carried by Council.

WHEREAS President Trump has suggested that with the use of “economic force” such as tariffs, Canada should become the 51st state of the United States, and further he suggests that many Canadians would agree;

AND WHEREAS Canada is a sovereign nation with a peaceful history of self-governance dating to its Confederation in 1867;

AND WHEREAS the Canadian identity is marked by a deep-rooted pride in its heritage and culture founded by French and British settlement, enriched by Indigenous culture and traditions, and by more than a century and a half of multicultural immigration;

AND WHEREAS Canada has significant global standing, consistently supporting its allies, including the United States, in global conflicts such as two world wars, and wars in Korea and Afghanistan; and in international coalitions and in being consistently recognized as among the top countries in the world for quality of life;

AND WHEREAS the shared history of the United States and Canada has been one of friendship, respect, and neighbourly relations;

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved that the Council of the Town of Fort Frances categorically rejects any efforts by incoming President Trump or any others to undermine the sovereignty of Canada. We stand united with our Ontario Premier Doug Ford and our Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau for a Canada that remains strong, free, independent, and characterized by peace, order, and good government.

AND FURTHER THAT the Mayor prepare correspondence containing this resolution for circulation to the office of the American president through our Canadian diplomatic channels with copies to The Right Honourable Justin Trudeau, Prime Minister, The Honourable Melanie Joly, Minister of Foreign Affairs, MP Michael Chong, Premier Doug Ford, The Honourable Vic Fedeli, Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade of Ontario, MPP Ted Arnott, Leaders of the Opposition Parties, AMO, FCM, and all municipalities in Ontario.

MINUTES

9-1-1 MANAGEMENT BOARD

February 11, 2025

A regular meeting of the 9-1-1 Management Board was held in Meeting Room 1-A, Regional Municipality of Durham Headquarters, 605 Rossland Road East, Whitby, at 1:03 PM. Electronic participation was permitted for this meeting.

1. Roll Call

2. Appointment of Chair

N. Prasad advised that in accordance with the provisions contained in the 9-1-1 Joint Powers Agreement, it is required that a representative of either the Police or Fire Agencies Chair the meetings on a rotating annual basis.

As the meetings were chaired by Fire Services in 2024, the 2025 meetings will be chaired by Police.

Gord O'Blenes assumed the Chair for the remainder of the meeting.

3. Declarations of Pecuniary Interest

There were no declarations of pecuniary interest.

4. Adoption of Minutes

Moved by J. Wichman, Seconded by M. Simpson,

(1) That the minutes of the 9-1-1 Management Board meeting held on
November 12, 2024, be adopted.

CARRIED

5. 9-1-1 Call Statistics

J. Wichman provided the statistics on calls transferred from January to December 2024. He stated that there has been a decrease in wireless hangups which can be attributed to the resulting work from the Android update done in the summer of 2023. He advised that as a result of the public education from the Region as well as other Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) across Canada, there has been an overall reduction in call volume.

J. Wichman stated that there is normally a five to seven percent increase yearly on the call volume. He stated there was an increase of admin calls in 2023 of 327,000 and in 2024 an increase of 345,000. He also stated that there has been a decrease of about 12,000 hangups from 2023 to 2024.

J. Wichman stated he has had discussions with Bell 911 as well as the Greater Toronto Area PSAPs and they are all seeing a decrease in call volume. He advised that 9-1-1 calls decreased from 256,983 in 2023 to 229,483 in 2024. He stated that DRPS saw an increase in the administrative lines and calls for service from 2023 to 2024.

J. Wichman advised he will continue to look into the reasons behind the decrease in calls.

6. DRPS Update re: 9-1-1 System

J. Wichman advised that since the last 9-1-1 Management Board meeting, there have been no major outages or issues with the 9-1-1 System.

7. Confidential Matters

There were no confidential matters.

Other Departments - Comments/Concerns

1. Comments/Concerns – Regional Council

There were no comments.

2. Comments/Concerns – Durham Police

J. Wichman advised that the first evacuation of 2025 is scheduled for February 13 to 15, 2025. He stated that a real time operation centre is going into the building so there may be some disruption. He stated that they will be evacuating to the backup site, and that Bell 911 will be running a fibre cable from Taunton Road to the 4060 Anderson building to allow for entrance redundancy for engine 911 circuits.

J. Wichman also advised that April 13 to 19, 2025 is National Public Safety Telecommunicator Week which is a week to celebrate the personnel in the 911 Centres. Regional Chair Henry requested that a letter be sent to his office to prepare an official proclamation of the week.

J. Wichman further stated there are currently 12 PSAPs in Canada on the Next-Generation 9-1-1 (NG9-1-1) System and hopes to see an increase in that number. He advised there is no set date for the decommissioning of E9-1-1 and that the date will most likely be announced March 3, 2025.

Councillor Garrod expressed an interest in visiting the Call Centre during the National Public Safety Telecommunicator Week.

3. Comments/Concerns – Fire Departments

There were no comments.

4. Comments/Concerns – Oshawa Central Ambulance Communications Centre (CACC)

W. Spindler advised that renovations to the Centre is starting in the next couple weeks. He advised that the CACC will be moving from eight consoles to ten which will allow for two more call takers on the floor as they transition to the Medical Priority Dispatch System (MPDS).

W. Spindler also advised they have added to their leadership team, and now have five operations managers on board. The goal is to have 24/7 management oversight in the CACC as they transition to MPDS.

W. Spindler also advised that the CACC transitioned to a telephony system on December 9, 2024 which gives more ability to split the workload between people. The system is routed automatically to call takers depending on when they took their last call and gives the ability to pull data on how many calls have been taken and how long the calls were.

5. Comments/Concerns – Durham Finance

M. Simpson advised that she has been working with J. Wichman on this year's allocation for the NextGen 9-1-1 grant. She advised that the orders are being processed and the reporting requirements are being met.

M. Simpson also advised that the Region continues to support the work in bringing the new 9-1-1 system on board.

6. Comments/Concerns – Region of Durham Paramedic Services

T. Cheseboro was absent.

8. **Other Business**

There was no other business.

9. **Date of Next Meeting**

April 29, 2025 at 10 AM at the Regional Municipality of Durham Headquarters, 605 Rossland Road East, Whitby.
