L. Fenn responded to questions from the Committee with regards to half load shipments and whether the sedimentation being experienced along the harbour has an impact on load capacities; the anticipated timeframe for extending the east wharf; whether such an extension would increase port capacity to permit an additional cargo ship; whether federal or provincial environmental assessments would be completed as part of the extension study process; how the film industry contributes as a key sector to the Oshawa port; whether the port is seasonally operated; and whether the "just-in-time" freight service offered by HOPA may be impacted by future shipment strategies.

Growing the Network

Growing the Network




Figure 1: Kilometres (km) of new PCN routes by facility type implemented on Regional roads in 2023 and 2024

Between 2023 and 2024, the Region has added over 28 km of cycling facilities across Durham, supporting safe, comfortable travel for people of all ages and abilities, as shown in Figure 1.

Growing the Network




Figure 2: Kilometres (km) of short-term cycling facilities planned and built on Regional Page 16 of 62

The RCP proposes 162 km of new cycling facilities over the next 10 years, including Multi-Use Paths (MUPs) and onroad infrastructure across all eight area municipalities. Figure 2 highlights the kilometres of cycling facilities planned and built on Regional Roads.

Continued progress depends on regular network reviews and identifying new opportunities and resources to accelerate implementation.

Increasing Cycling Mode Share

Increasing Cycling Mode Share




Figure 3: Summary of average daily cyclist counts collected at Regional bike count locations during a one-week period during summer 2024

Cycling counts are conducted over a one-week period during the summer at 295 stations on Regional roads. Conducting these counts helps us better understand the volume of network users and determine locations for connectivity improvements (Figure 3).

As set out in the Durham Transportation Master Plan, the Region has a target of 9% of Durham residents walking and cycling and 20% using public transit by 2031.

Based on 2022 Transportation Tomorrow Survey (TTS) data, the Region is on track for achieving its active mode share target.

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Enhancing Education and Awareness

Enhancing Education and Awareness

The Region developed a clear set of messages to effectively promote and educate cyclists about cycling in Durham Region to use throughout various cycling-supportive campaigns and programs. Reach and engagement with programs and cycling educational materials has increased annually since the RCP was implemented.







Key Features:

- 13 routes
- Routes range from 8km to 60km
- Connects cyclists via onroad rural cycling loops to tourism experiences to encourage cycling tourism within Durham
- Promotes scenic recreational routes for cyclists of all skill levels



Looking Ahead Future Projects and Next Steps for the Network

Upcoming Projects for 2025




Figure 4: Summary of 2025 planned active transportation projects

The Region plans to continue building out the Primary Cycling Network (PCN) through a combination of capital road program and standalone infill projects, as illustrated in Figure 4. These projects expand connectivity and access across the Region.

- 12.3 km of new active transportation infrastructure is planned through capital road projects.
- 9.0 km of new active transportation infrastructure is planned through standalone infill projects.
- Projects are strategic links toward a complete and connect region-wide PCN.
- Projects address safety, help connect people to key destinations, and lay the groundwork for a more complete, connected and accessible cycling network.

Advance Short-Term Cycling Routes

Focus on implementing routes identified through the RCP and the Region's nine-year capital budget and forecast in 2025.



Improve Monitoring & Tracking

Coordinate with area municipal staff and other partners to improve the monitoring and tracking of active transportation assets, including a new map viewer, and establishing a set of indicators to track active transportation.



Develop Bicycle Parking Guidelines

Work with a consultant to initiate the development of bicycle parking guidelines with completion in March 2026.



Report Back

Provide annual updates to Council on the progress made to advance active transportation and recommendations of the RCP.

Report:

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to outline the annual progress made in implementing the Region's active transportation infrastructure initiatives and recommendations identified in the Regional Cycling Plan (RCP) in 2023 and 2024. Attachment #1 - Active Transportation Progress Report 2023-2024, provides a comprehensive overview of the various activities and accomplishments in an easy-to-read, infographic format.

2. Background

2.1 The RCP identifies a Primary Cycling Network (PCN) and recommended that 162 km of cycling facilities be installed along the PCN by 2031 that fall within Regional jurisdiction. The RCP was updated in 2021, and focusses on actions and initiatives to support the expansion and enhancement of a Region-wide cycling network that is connected, accessible and comfortable for people of All Ages and Abilities (AAA).

- The RCP also considers the unique trip types and preferences of those that live, work, and play within Durham.
- 2.2 In January 2024, staff developed an <u>Active Transportation Progress Report</u> to summarize annual advancements being made on Regional active transportation projects and programs, since the adoption of the updated RCP.
- 2.3 In November 2024, the province introduced new legislation Bill 212 Reducing Gridlock, Saving You Time Act, which requires municipalities to seek provincial approval before adding new bicycle lanes that remove a traffic lane. The Region's practice typically aligns cycling facility implementation with road-widening, reconstruction and rehabilitation projects that do not require the removal of an existing traffic lane. As such, Regional staff do not anticipate that any approval by the province will be required to implement the PCN.

3. New Cycling Facilities Added to the PCN in 2023-2024

- 3.1 Throughout 2023 and 2024, the Region has added several new cycling facilities on the PCN to support different cycling trip types and comfort levels. Implementing a range of cycling facilities helps improve connectivity and comfort for a range of ages and abilities and further supports the Region's <u>Vision Zero goals</u>.





Figure 1: Summary of average daily cyclist counts collected through Regional bike count locations during a one-week period during summer 2024.

- 3.2 A total of 28.4 kilometres (km) of cycling routes on the PCN were completed between January 2023 and December 2024. Figure 1 illustrates the length of these cycling routes by facility type (in km) added to the PCN on Regional roads in 2023 and 2024.
- 3.3 The length of completed PCN routes in both 2023 and 2024 exceed the target completion of 8.5 km per year identified in the RCP.

4. Summary of Progress on Implementing Supportive Cycling Infrastructure in 2024

- 4.1 A weekly total of 400,452 cyclist counts was recorded during a one-week interval in the summer of 2024, based on data collected at 295 count station locations across Regional roads in Durham. One station was removed from the count in 2024 due to its proximity to another, ensuring the data reflects accurate usage patterns. These counts are comparable to 2023 and reflect a strong and stable demand for cycling infrastructure.
- 4.2 The Region has installed three signalized crossrides and 20 pedestrian crossovers (PXOs) across Regional roads and intersections to help make it safer and easier for people to walk and bike throughout the region.

5. Additional Active Transportation Achievements

- 5.1 In addition to expanding the cycling network, progress has been made on the following RCP actions. These actions have either been initiated or completed as of year-end 2024:
 - a. Policies and Plan Development:
 - Bicycle Parking Guidelines: currently procuring consulting services to develop guidelines for bicycle parking across Durham Region. This will assist municipalities, developers, and stakeholders in providing highquality bicycle parking facilities and determining optimal locations.

- Durham Meadoway Visioning Study: the vision for a 30-kilometre pedestrian, cycling, and linear park corridor has been completed, setting the framework for future development of this significant active transportation corridor.
- Cycling Wayfinding and Signage Strategy: a region-wide, cohesive signage system was completed to promote cycling, improve the use of the Primary Cycling Network (PCN), and enhance cyclist safety and experience.

b. Infrastructure Funding:

• Federal Active Transportation Fund Application: the Region applied for funding to support the implementation of over 13 km of additional cycling routes to accelerate the expansion of the PCN. We anticipate receiving an update on the status of our application by fall of 2025.

c. AT Recognition Initiatives:

 Bicycle Friendly Communities Designation Application: the Region applied for the Share the Road Bicycle Friendly Community Bronze designation to recognize progress in enhancing cycling infrastructure and creating a bike-friendly community. We anticipate receiving an update on the status of our application in June 2025.

d. Public Engagement and Education:

- Active Transportation Educational Campaigns: hosted a series of initiatives coordinated through the Smart Mobility program and Active and Sustainable School Travel (ASST) programs, focusing on promoting safe cycling and encouraging the use of active transportation.
- **Social Media Engagement:** Regional social media posts generated 690,358 impressions in 2024, raising awareness about cycling safety, sustainable transportation, and active transportation benefits.

e. Digital Tools and Reporting:

 External Active Transportation Map Viewer: an interactive map is being developed to provide the public with detailed information on the active transportation network, monitor progress, and ensure transparency. We expect to have the viewer ready for December 2025.

6. Next Steps

- 6.1 Regional staff will continue to advance the implementation of short-term cycling routes identified through the RCP and the Region's nine-year capital budget and forecast in 2025.
- 6.2 Regional staff will continue to coordinate with area municipal staff and other partners to improve the monitoring and tracking of active transportation assets and establish a set of indicators to improve evaluation and tracking of active transportation infrastructure, amenities, and programs.
- 6.3 Regional staff will report back to Council on the progress made annually to advance active transportation and recommendations of the RCP.

7. Previous Reports and Decisions

- 7.1 The RCP received approval in October 2021 through Report #2021-COW-26 and a staff presentation was provided which summarized the draft 2021 RCP.
- 7.2 On January 31, 2024, Council received Report #2024-P-5 for information of the progress made in advancing active transportation infrastructure and initiatives between 2022-2023.

8. Relationship to Strategic Plan

- 8.1 This report aligns with the following Strategic Direction(s) and Pathway(s) in Durham Region's 2025-2035 Strategic Plan:
 - a. Connected and Vibrant Communities
 - C4. Improve road safety, including the expansion and connection of active transportation networks to enhance the range of safe mobility options.

b. Strong Relationships

- S1. Enhance inclusive opportunities for community engagement and meaningful collaboration.
- S5. Ensure accountable and transparent decision-making to serve community needs, while responsibly managing available resources.

9. Conclusion

- 9.1 This report helps demonstrate the progress that the Region of Durham is making to support active transportation, while further strengthening partnerships between the Region, area municipalities, local cycling and active transportation groups and the public.
- 9.2 Continuing to invest in active transportation is imperative in establishing the Region as a premier cycling destination, a leader in coordinating and delivering community-based cycling initiatives and programs and achieving its sustainable mobility targets.



Increasing Active Transportation Mode Share

This section provides a snapshot of sustainable travel behaviour and provides a pulse on the volume of active transportation trips along key active transportation corridors. It identifies additional active transportation infrastructure and supportive amenities that the Region has recently implemented to help improve comfort and safety along key active transportation routes.



Increasing Cycling Mode Share

In 2024, the Region conducted cycling counts over a one-week period at 295 stations on Regional roads throughout Durham.

Conducting these counts along key cycling routes helps us better understand the volume of network users and help determine locations for connectivity improvements.

Figure 1 shows the average daily cycling counts from the one-week count conducted in summer of 2024, highlighting the highest-volume location in each municipality.

As set out in the Durham <u>Transportation</u>

<u>Master Plan</u>, the Region has a target of 9% of Durham residents walking and cycling and 20% using public transit during the AM peak period by 2031. Based on the recent Transportation Tomorrow Survey (TTS) data, the Region is on track to achieving its active mode share target.





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


Figure 4: Kilometres (km) of short-term cycling facilities planned and built on Regional Roads between 2022 to 2024.





Report:

1. Purpose

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to:
 - a. Provide an annual update on the activities of the Durham Farm Fresh Marketing Association (DFFMA); provide an update on their planned activities; and advise that a DFFMA representative will be appearing as a delegation before the Community Growth and Economic Development Committee at its meeting on June 3, 2025; and
 - b. Inform Members of the Community Growth and Economic Development Committee that the first week of June each year is Ontario Local Food Week.

2. Background

2.1 The Agriculture and Rural Economic Development section of the Economic Development and Tourism Division works with several local agricultural

- organizations, including the DFFMA, to implement programming in support of the agricultural and rural economy in Durham Region.
- 2.2 The Region contributes \$13,500 in core funding annually to the DFFMA through the Division's Annual Business Plan and Budget to support the local agri-food sector.
- 2.3 The DFFMA is a largely volunteer-led and membership-based organization with one part-time coordinator. DFFMA has been promoting the production and consumption of local food in Durham Region for over 30 years.
- 2.4 Established in 1993, the DFFMA has been a leader in the producer-led local food marketing movement in Ontario. Members of Regional Council, businesses, and residents will be familiar with the DFFMA branding; including: the annual "Buy Fresh Buy Local" brochure and maps; directional road signs; and the <u>DFFMA website</u> promoting its members.
- 2.5 There were 40 DFFMA members in 2024. DFFMA's membership structure has categories for full members, associate members and supporting members. This reflects the evolving interests of consumers in not only local food products but also local food experiences, local beverages, agri-tourism (e.g. sunflower, and lavender farms) and other forms of on-farm diversification.

3. Previous Reports and Decisions

- 3.2 #2025-EDT-2 Gather at the Farm 2024 Agri-Food Marketing Campaign
- 3.3 #2024-EDT-11 Local Food in Durham Region: Durham Farm Fresh Marketing Association Annual Update and Ontario Local Food Week. DFFMA reports to Committee annually.

4. 2024 Review and 2025 Workplan Activities

4.1 Throughout 2024, the DFFMA continued to support their members by facilitating joint marketing opportunities through KX-96 radio campaigns to highlight members timed with seasonal products, re-designing their brochure and farm maps, re-designing their website, offering networking and social opportunities for farm members to increase their business-to-business connections and focused on advancing their key priorities including policy reform, funding opportunities, education, member recruitment, and more.

- 4.2 Over the past year, Agriculture and Rural Economic Development Section staff and DFFMA have collaborated to complete several activities that support the agri-food sector:
 - Supporting the advancement of the joint DFFMA and Durham Farm Connections Rural Economic Development grant workplan activities;
 - b. Hosted an agriculture ambassador volunteer training session with Farm and Food Care in July 2024;
 - c. Gather at the Farm digital marketing campaign to highlight farm product and experiences offered across the region throughout the month of October 2024;
 - d. DFFMA and Durham Tourism jointly hosted two on-farm culinary activation events in June and October 2024;
 - e. Agriculture Economic Development staff gave regular updates and consulted with DFFMA on the Enabling Agriculture-Related and On-Farm Diversified Uses in North Durham project.
- 4.3 Staff continue to engage the DFFMA regularly to advance the implementation of the Growing Agri-Food Durham Plan. Plans are underway to collaborate on a selection of culinary activations that highlight local food products in 2025.

5. Ontario Local Food Week - June 2 to 8, 2025

- 5.1 Every year, the first week of June marks Ontario Local Food Week. This is an opportunity to make an intentional effort to shop local and support the local agri-food economy. Buying and supporting local food creates jobs and contributes to economic growth.
- 5.2 Below are some ways to celebrate Ontario Local Food Week in Durham Region:
 - a. Purchase from DFFMA members; look for their recognizable road signs on Regional roads, or visit www.durhamfarmfresh.ca and use the interactive farm map to find members across the region;
 - b. Search for local farms across the region by visiting www.investdurham.ca/localfood; and
 - c. Promote Ontario Local Food Week on social media, use the hashtag #LoveONTfood and tag Invest Durham and Durham Farm Fresh.

6. Relationship to Strategic Plan

- 7.2 As trends in the agri-food industry continue to shift to meet the demands of consumers, the DFFMA continues to offer a collaborative marketing platform and business opportunities for local food producers across the region.

7.3 Staff will continue to work closely with DFFMA to assist in their sustainability plans and encourage consumers to buy fresh and buy local.

Spark Centre Annual Update and Metrics Report 2024

Report:

1. Purpose

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide Committee with an update on the activities of Spark Centre and supply the performance metrics received from Spark Centre in their 2024 Annual General Meeting. Metrics and results in this report noted as "to date" are up to and inclusive of March 31, 2024.
- 1.2 This report will be accompanied by a delegation from Gary Jarosz, Interim CEO and Kristy Sansom, Spark Centre Director of Operations and Client Success, to provide an update to Committee.

2. Background

2.1 Spark Centre was founded in 2014. Located in Downtown Oshawa, Spark Centre is Durham Region's local Regional Innovation Centre (RIC). The mandate of RICs is to help Ontario's entrepreneurs and innovators succeed in international markets by helping them work through the challenges of developing their ideas to make them marketable, and attract talent, capital and customers. Spark Centre is mandated to

- provide these services to technology entrepreneurs in both Durham Region and Northumberland County.
- 2.2 Spark Centre is funded primarily by the Province of Ontario through the Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation, and Trade (MEDJCT) and is additionally supported through annual core funding by the City of Oshawa and Durham Region Economic Development and Tourism.
- 2.3 In 2019, Spark Centre established itself as a designate of Canada's Startup Visa Program (SUV) through Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). This allows Spark Centre to support the immigration of business founders to establish their companies in Durham Region, which attracts capital, creates jobs, and generates additional gross domestic product (GDP) through the immigration of founders and their families. To date, Spark Centre has landed 118 newcomer businesses and attracted more than \$37 million in capital funds to the region.
- 2.4 In 2022, Spark Centre was awarded \$2.5 million dollars over three years to lead the Durham Regional Technology Development Site (Durham RTDS). This initiative is done in partnership with the Region of Durham, Durham College, and Ontario Tech University. The Durham RTDS advances Durham Region as a centre of excellence for electrification and smart city innovation. This program, which has sites across Ontario, is called the Ontario Vehicle Innovation Network (OVIN) and is funded by the Ontario Centre of Innovation (OCI).
- 2.5 In early 2023, Spark Centre became one of only four delivery partners of the ElevateIP Program, a federally funded program to advance the commercialization of intellectual property (IP). This program will support Spark clients as they build their IP portfolios and will provide \$266,632 in funding over a period of three years.
- 2.6 In June 2024 Spark Centre was awarded a \$2 million dollar investment from the Federal Economic Development Agency for Southern Ontario to support the Landing Pad Accelerator Program for Newcomer and Female Entrepreneurs in the Energy, Engineering, and Environment (EN3) sector. This four-year initiative (2024-2028) is designed to support 80 startups (founded by newcomers or females) establishing in eastern Ontario, fostering the creation of 80 jobs, supporting the development of 80 IP assets and will deliver millions in direct investment to eastern Ontario.
- 2.7 Durham Region Economic Development and Tourism has been providing core funding to Spark Centre annually since 2014 through the Region's Annual Business Plan and Budget. Durham Region Economic Development and Tourism provided

- \$50,000 in funding to Spark Centre in 2024, and \$50,000 has been included in the 2025 Annual Business Plan and Budget.
- 2.8 The Region of Durham and Spark Centre are parties to a funding agreement, and regular reporting on the activities of Spark Centre to Committee and Council is a requirement of that funding agreement. Spark will appear before Committee to report on inquiries and referrals, affected sectors, investment, employment impact, patents pending and issued, and more generally on Spark's business plans, work plans, and achievements.

3. Previous Reports and Decisions

3.1 A Spark Centre update is typically provided annually. The last update was provided in January of 2024 on Fiscal Years 2022 and 2023 (FY22, FY23) under report #2024-EDT-1.

4. Full Year 2024 Annual Metrics

4.1 Spark Centre reports on their activities through an Annual General Meeting. Durham Region Economic Development and Tourism collects, tracks, and reports the metrics provided by Spark Centre on an annual basis. These annual metrics are below:

- 4.2 In FY24 Spark and Synergy Lab had a staff complement of 19 Full Time Employees (FTEs), as well as engagements with external advisors specializing in marketing, finance, commercialization, sales and investment. Spark Centre functions include: Marketing (4 FTEs) showcasing client products and accomplishments and Eastern Ontario as an innovation destination; delivering the Start-Up Visa Program (2 FTEs) a program that expedites visas for foreign technology entrepreneurs seeking to relocate to Canada; an Eastern Ontario Innovation Corridor Project (2 FTEs) an initiative to coordinate programming delivery across eastern Ontario including Kingston and Ottawa; and, delivering client services for Durham-based technology entrepreneurs (6 FTE + external advisors/mentors) to provide clients with the tools, skills and knowledge necessary to secure venture capital and reach commercialization.
- 4.3 Spark and Synergy Lab are tenants of 2 Simcoe Street in downtown Oshawa. Spark Centre currently has multiple clients renting offices and desk space.
- 4.4 In FY24, Spark Centre added funding programs for commercialization of intellectual property to their services, with funding support from the Federal government dispersed through their collaboration partner Invest Ottawa.
- 4.5 In January 2025, long-time Spark Centre CEO Sherry Colbourne retired from her roles with both Spark Centre and Synergy Lab Inc. As of the date this report was authored, the Board of Directors is currently undertaking a recruitment process for a new Executive Director.
- 4.6 Considerable time and effort has been dedicated to growing the Synergy Lab business, with a mandate to provide market-entry services for a fee to international technology entrepreneurs looking to establish themselves in Canada, in advancement of innovation in Durham and across Eastern Ontario.
- 4.7 The Region has ensured that the Spark Centre funding agreement contains sufficient protections to ensure the Region's core funding will only be used to

support the core activities of the Spark Centre, and not those of Synergy Lab Inc, and that the terms shall be to the satisfaction of the Regional Solicitor.

6.2 Spark Centre, as Durham Region's Regional Innovation Centre, has a mandate to support local, Durham Region-based technology entrepreneurs in reaching commercialization, and to play a central role in Durham's innovation ecosystem.
